

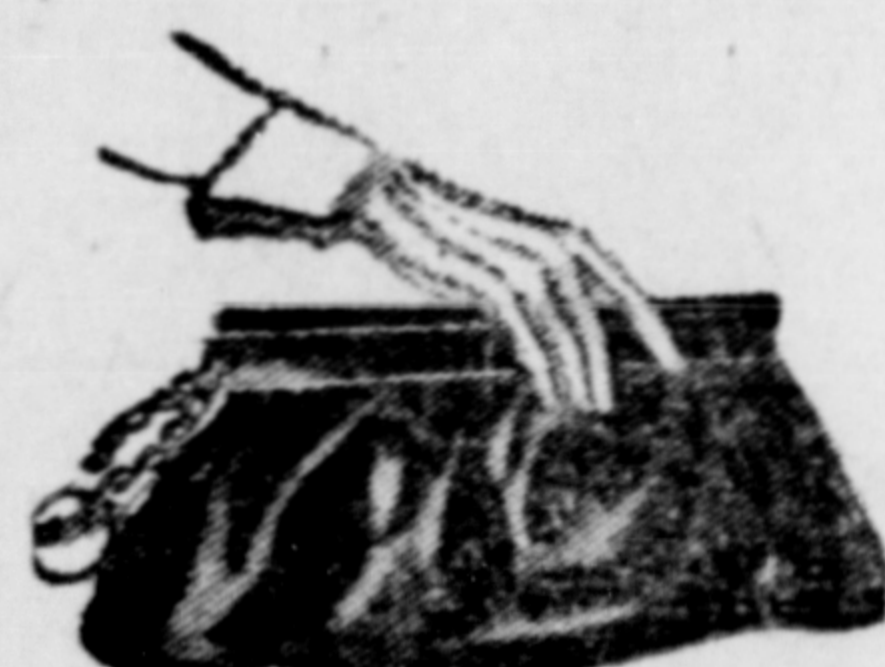

YOUNG FIGHTERS GO SOUTH FOR GOLDEN GLOVES

All set to win fame and glory for themselves and Prince Rupert, two local boys, age 12 and 14, embarked last night for Vancouver to enter special training class in the Vancouver Sun's fifth annual Golden Gloves boxing tournament.

The boys are Jordan Smith, 12-year old 60-pounder, son of J. W. Smith, 1400 Overlook St., and Robert Anderson, age 14, weight 89 pounds, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Anderson, 1438 Piggott Place, and they are going south under the auspices of the Boilermakers' Athletic Club, recently taken over by the Kinsmen's Club.

The tournament, which will be held February 16-17, is sponsored by the B.C. Amateur Boxing Association. This is the first time that local boys have gone south for this event, the experts say. Ray Smith, well known Acropolis fighter, will look after the boys in the ring.

Both boys are in top condition. Jordan recently won a match at Acropolis Hill against a lad far heavier than himself.

Team of Eight Yanks Leave for Vancouver

Corporal Ray Smith, Alaskan welterweight champion and boxing instructor on Acropolis Hill, left for the south last night with his stable of eight boxers who are entered in the Vancouver Sun's service golden gloves tournament.

Six of the eight are going to compete in novice classes while the other two are entering the open. The latter pair are Wellman Wallace, of Lexington, Ky., lightweight, and Charley Morris, of Jonesboro, Ky., 148-pounder.

Prince Rupert will be represented in the novice light-heavyweight division by Larry Vaughn, while George Hoppe will make his bid in the 148-pound class.

Other entrants in the novice section will be Floyd Gage, Binghamton, N.Y., 126 pounds; Carl Seymour, Los Angeles, Cal., 132; Billy Sonnenburg, Iron Mountain, Mich., 140; and Manuel Gallardo, El Paso, Texas, 155 pounds.

The tournament will last for two days, February 16 and 17, this Friday and Saturday.

Was Authority On Wren Architecture

LONDON, Feb. 13 (AP)—Arthur Thomas Bolton, F.S.A., F.R.I.B.A., an architectural scholar of great distinction, died at the age of 80. He had been curator of Sir John Soane's Museum in London's Lincoln Inn Fields since 1917.

The final volume of 20 Wren Society Publications, all of which appeared under his joint editorship, was issued only a few days before his death. Almost every extant Wren drawing or plan was contained in the volumes, seven of which were devoted to St. Paul's Cathedral.

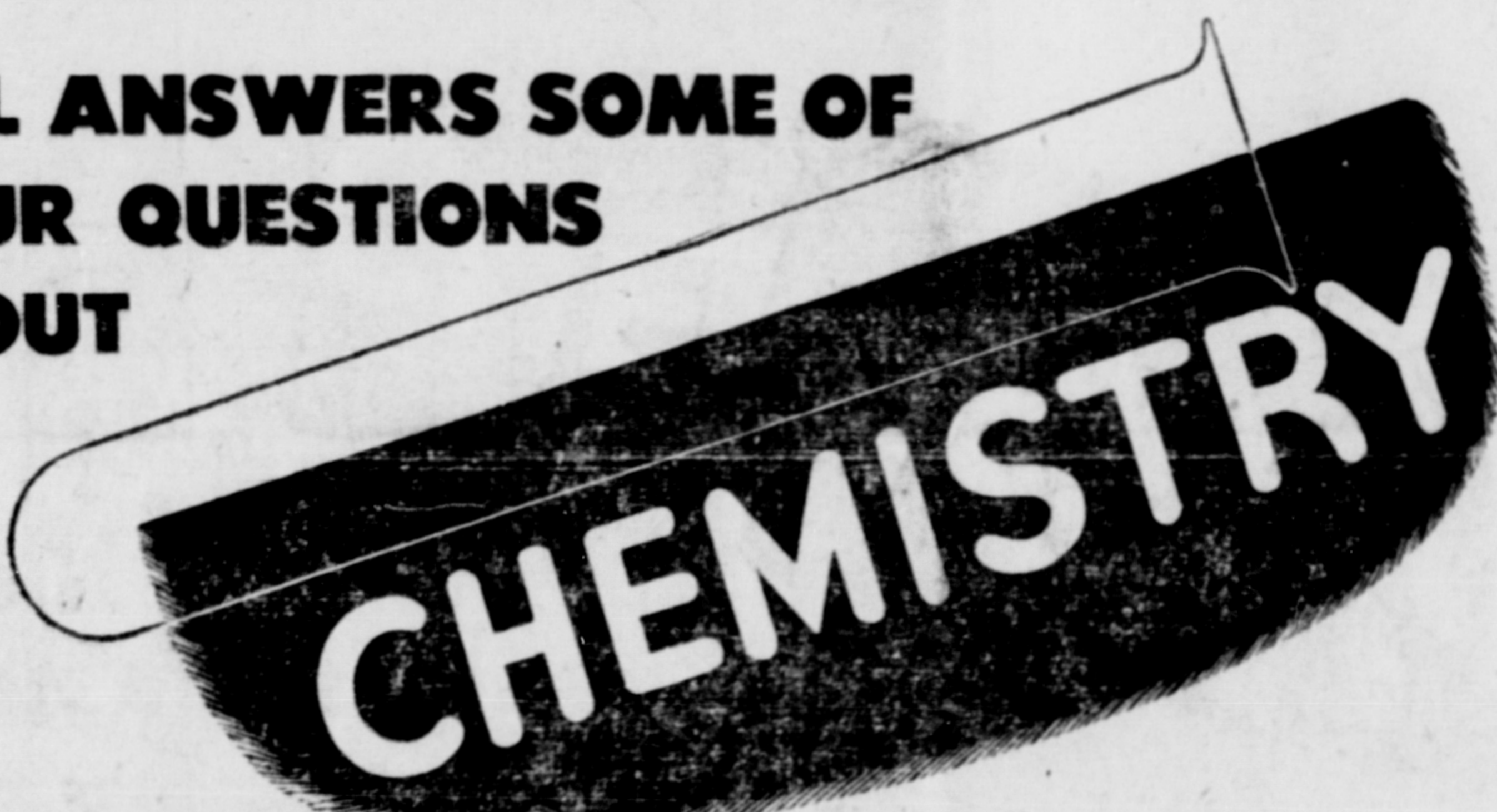

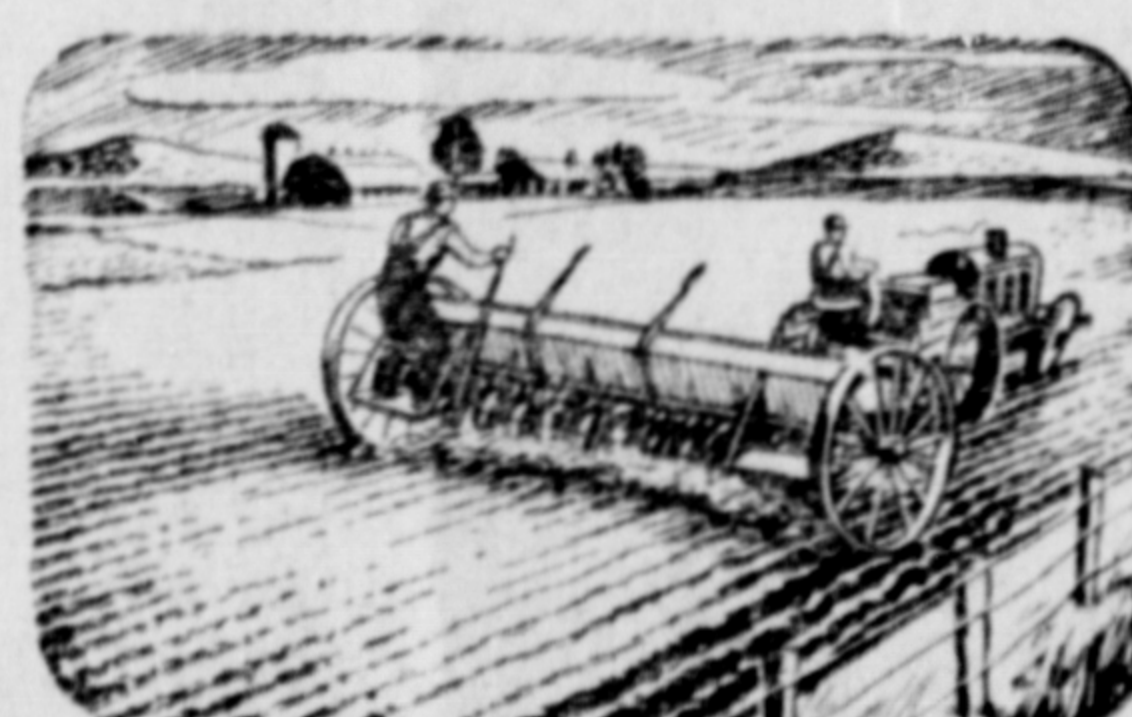
