lowed by the Treaty of Versailles the terms of which had upset the economic balance of Europe, causing the setting up of economic barriers and in turn leading to the Second Great War.

Nazi philosophy, designed merely for the economic development of Germany and the domination of Europe, yet appealing to the people, had scrapped humanitarian considerations in many nations of Europe which had fallen into the German sphere and had made inherent an attitude among many people that the power of force alone mattered.

Now Germany was defeated but the end was not yet for the war left in its wake this nihilistic attitude, the overcoming of which was the great problem of the future. The question was whether mankind was itself going to do something about solving this great problem which mankind, through its own attitude, had raised. Would or would not the final phase of the industrial revolution bring about a new and better society? The only hope for salvation, the speaker felt, was an acceptance of a philosophy of personal idealism as opposed to state idealogy.

Sergeant Major Sherwood was thanked for his address by Dr. J. J. Gibson, president of the Gyro Club, who occupied the chair. In addition to Gyro members there were several guests including Lieut.
