**The Experts Say - -**

**SAVING FATS AND OILS**—Every woman can develop her own code of thrift in the use of fats and oils. At this season there is an excellent opportunity to make the most of the chicken fat which may be a left-over from a tasty dinner of roast chicken or stewed fowl.

When you prepare a bird for roasting or stewing, be sure to remove all excess fat from the body cavity before cooking.

The best way to render chicken fat is to cut the fat into small pieces. Then melt it in the top of a double boiler or use a heavy kettle over a moderate fire, or to save fuel, use the oven after it has been used for baking. Next strain the fat slightly, skim and cool it through a piece of damp cheesecloth or a fine sieve into a container.

Rendered fats should be stored in a tightly covered tin container or glass jar in a cool, dry place away from the light.

Rendered chicken fat, with its bland flavor and soft texture, may be used for most types of cooking. Chicken fat can be used in place of other shortenings in cake, tea biscuits, muffins and cookies.

Home economists have found that when substituting chicken fat for other shortenings less of the chicken fat is needed. They recommend that 2/3 of the amount called for in the recipe is sufficient. Because chicken fat is so bland it is a good idea to use a little more salt when using it in place of other fats.

**THIMBLE COOKIES**—Here's a simple recipe for Thimble Cookies using 1/2 cup of chicken fat in place of 1/2 cup of shortening. Thimble cookies require 1/2 cup chicken fat, 1/4 cup brown sugar, one egg yolk, one cup pastry flour, one teaspoon vanilla and 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Cream shortening and sugar thoroughly, add egg yolk and beat well. Mix in flour, vanilla and salt. Form into balls, place on a greased cookie sheet and dent the top with a thimble. Bake five minutes in a moderate oven, 350 degrees Fahrenheit, then dent again. Bake 15 minutes longer. Put jelly or jam in the depression while still hot. This makes 1 1/2 dozen cookies.

**LEFTOVER SALADS**—If the family left any meat on the Christmas bird there are several ways to dress it up so that no one would ever know the dish was a glorified left-over. Turkey salad mould is specially welcome after heavy holiday meals. Chicken may be used for the recipe equally well.

Turkey salad mould requires 1 1/2 tablespoons gelatine, 1/4 cup cold water, 3/4 cup cooked salad dressing, one cup of celery cut fine, two cups cooked diced turkey (or chicken), 1/4 cup chopped unpeeled apple, chopped pimento or green pepper.

Soak the gelatine in cold water. Dissolve over hot water and add to salad dressing. Fold in chicken or turkey, celery and apple. Season to taste. Mould and chill. Unmould on crisp lettuce. This makes six servings.

**NELLIE McCLUNG REVIEWS CAREER IN LATEST BOOK**

Women with hobbies have brighter outlooks than those without them, Nellie L. McClung discovered in the early years of her married life in Manitowish, Manitoba. Her own double hobby of consuming interest in public life and writing is vividly reflected in *The Stream Runs Fast*, (Thomas Allen), the second volume of her autobiography.

Picking up the thread of her life where the first volume, "Clearing the West," left off, Mrs. McClung carried her own story through almost 50 years, from 1896, the year she was married, to 1945 when she wrote the closing chapter of "The Stream Runs Fast" in her present home at Lantern Lane, near Victoria. She surveys her work as homemaker, crusader for women's rights, Alberta legislator and author of eight books.

The book reflects the rugged life of the prairie and the women who make homes there. It carries with it the atmosphere of the land's "purple twilights, her phantom breezes, the smell of burning leaves, the ripe tints of autumn, the slanting snow—a land of sudden changes of weather and killing frosts."

**Varied Experiences**

There are human and heartening incidents—the reading of Dickens' Christmas Carol in Manitowish Orange Hall a draughty place heated by one stove in the middle of the room, the stirring of Mrs. McClung's ambition to be a public speaker after making an address of welcome to a W. C. T. U. convention and the successful petition to the privy council by five Canadian wo-

men headed by Judge Emily Murphy to have women declared persons.

No woman who reads "The Stream Runs Fast" can fail to be stirred by the sincerity and energy with which Nellie McClung approached every adventure and opportunity which her crowded life offered. Rich in experiences of Western Canada, this straightforward, modest book traces not only the years but also the growth of a philosophy of life based upon concern for others and the ideal of a better world.

Most of all, the book is witness to the author's conviction that "Canada is destined to be one of the great nations of the world and Canadian women must be ready for citizenship. No nation ever rises higher than its women."


