BROTHER OF LOCAL MAN IS NOW IN MANILA

After 45 months as a Japanese prisoner-of-war, L/Cpl. Stewart Ganton of Prince George, whose brother, Mark Ganton, lives in Prince Rupert, is now in an American clearing station at Manila and is expecting to return to Canada "soon."

Ganton was captured at Hong Kong in December, 1941, with the Winnipeg Grenadiers Regiment and, in a letter to his wife in Prince George, he describes Jap prison camp life as "hell on earth."

His brother, Mark, is employed at Sheardown's Grocery here.

Indicating the neglect and abuse he received at the hands of the Japs is his statement that when he returns to Canada he expects to enter hospital at Vancouver for treatment of his left arm which stopped two pieces of shrapnel—presumably at the time he was captured almost four years ago.

Cpl. Ganton promises that he will never leave Canada again. "It will be like paradise after that hell-on-earth," he declared.

WOMEN IN ELECTIONS

Newspaperwomen, Teachers, Judges and Housewives Seek Seats in Thursday's Voting

VANCOUVER, Oct. 23. — Two newspaperwomen, a couple of former school teachers and a former juvenile court judge are among the women seeking seats in the British Columbia legislature in provincial general election Thursday. Majority of the 13 women among the 147 candidates are newcomers to the political field. In the 1941 election 12 contested seats and five were elected.

The two coalitionist candidates, Mrs. Nancy Hodges and Mrs. T. J. Rolston, are seeking re-election. Mrs. Hodges, women's editor of the Victoria Daily Times, is running in Victoria where she was elected as a Liberal in 1941. Mrs. Rolston, a veteran politician, is seeking re-election in Vancouver-Point Grey where she was chosen in 1941 as Conservative member.

The three C.C.F. women candidates running for re-election are Mrs. Laura Jamieson, contesting Vancouver Centre; Mrs. Grace MacInnis, Vancouver-Burrard, and Mrs. Dorothy Steeves, North Vancouver.

Mrs. Jamieson, a native of Park Head, Ont., was juvenile court judge in Burnaby during 1927-39. Winnipeg-born Mrs. MacInnis is the daughter of the late J. S. Woodsworth, founder of the C.C.F. Party. She was honorary parliamentary secretary to the C.C.F. group in the House of Commons during 1935-41.

Born in Amsterdam, Holland, Mrs. Steeves during the First Great War was employed as legal adviser in the Dutch government office charged with the distribu-

tion of food and other necessities.

C.C.F. novices on the B. C. political scene are Mrs. May Campbell, Victoria; Mrs. Gladys Webster, South Okanagan, and Mrs. Clare McAllister, Oak Bay. Mrs. Campbell moved to Penticton from Saskatchewan in 1937 where she has been a member of a fruit and vegetable workers union while employed in a Penticton cannery.

Mrs. McAllister, a University of British Columbia graduate and the mother of three children, taught school in Nova Scotia at one time. Mrs. Webster's husband, Arnold Webster, Vancouver school teacher, ran unsuccessfully as C.C.F. candidate for Vancouver-Burrard in the last Dominion election.

Mrs. E. Wilson, Burnaby, and Mrs. Jean Mason, Vancouver-Burrard, are on the Labor-Progressive ticket. As housewives and mothers both have been active in welfare and parent-teachers association work in their communities.

The Social Credit Party has chosen two women candidates, Mrs. Margaret Murray, Peace River, and Mrs. Lyle Campbell, Burnaby. Mrs. Murray, who with her husband, George Murray, runs the only newspaper of the Peace River area, is a prominent British Columbia journalist. Her husband is running as an Independent Progressive Liberal in Lillooet.

Only woman running as an independent is 60-year-old Mrs. Ellen Hart, who is contesting Victoria as an Independent Progressive Conservative.


