CO-OP BUILDS ICE SHEDS

SMITHERS, Feb. 5—The harvest of ice at Smithers has been completed at the earliest date in many years. The ice is of splendid quality, being about two feet in thickness and of clear green. Many thousands of tons have been stored away for summer use in the Booth Fisheries sheds at Lake Kathlyn and in local ice houses in town.
The Fishermen's Co-op in Rupert have made arrangements for the construction of two ice houses 100 feet by 30 feet at Lake Kathlyn alongside the ice houses of the Booth Fisheries already at that point. The building contractors of Smithers, Bovill & Hann, have the contract for the erection of these buildings which will be erected immediately. When completed they will be filled with ice by the Hanson Co. Ltd. of Smithers, who have the machinery and men for harvesting ice there.
