Timely Tips

Snip... Snip
Making a dress this spring. Here are some ideas, right from those who should know, to help you produce a masterpiece:
Be sure the style suits the wearer.
Alter the pattern, if necessary, to make it fit.
Unless definitely born to the seissors and thimble, take time to pin and baste carefully.
Fitting should be done over the same clothes that will be worn with the dress.
Cut around the neckline and armholes gingerly—or, all may be ruined! Mark a line and be sure it is right and then cut with a generous seam allowance beyond the marked line.
When not working on the dress, keep it on a clothes-hanger—this prevents wrinkles and allows bias pieces to fall into shape.
Hidden Danger
Never forget the moths—they will be around as usual. But you yourself should have first claim to your good clothes. Now is the time to start a campaign against the moth grub. It is the grub who eats the clothes. By the time the moths are flying around damage is done. Thoroughly

brush and shake clothes, especially those not worn often, and if possible air them out-of-doors. Wash winter clothes or have them cleaned before storing. Put them away sprinkled with naphthalene or moth crystals, and sealed up in brown paper.
