# STEAMSHIP INSPECTOR IS SPEAKER

Prior to becoming inspector for the Prince Rupert district and the Yukan 15 years ago, Mr. Bryden spent several years as inspector along the Mackenzie and Peace Rivers.

"Occasionally a Peace River farmer would become impressed with the amount of money that could be made from river transportation and he would call in his neighbors and whip together a boat. That was about as far as they ever got. When the inspector came along the boat never got into use," he said.

His job involved a variety of responsibilities from inspecting the tail shaft of a steamship to \$200 determining the buoyancy of 100 lifebelt, he declared.
