

Aged 32 and a sergeant in the R.A.F. London has been troubled for some times by a rib injury which doctors say is a bruised nerve. It isn't injurious to normal health but will always be a handicap in boxing and is not likely to yield to treatment. This, as well as his defeats, led to London's decision.
