To Hoop Final

Navy Wins Over Army

Final in "B" Section—Winners To Meet "A" Section Top Team For City Title

In a thrilling ding-dong melon-tossing melee, the issue of which was in doubt until the final second of the contest, Navy defeated Soo Suds 39 to 27 at the "Y" gymnasium Saturday night to cop the "B" section basketball title and the right to play in the final with the winners of "A" section for the city championship. A record crowd watched the game. The issue in the latter division has yet to be settled between Port-Edward, Acropolis and City.

Saturday night's game was the third in the series of "B" section play-offs, Soo Suds and Navy having each both previously won a game—Soo Suds the first 30 to 27 and Navy the second, 48 to 32.

Soo Suds, in the early stages of Saturday night's game, looked good for a win and finished up the first half on the long end of a 20 to 14 count. In spite of the strong Navy pressure, the Army still had the edge of a 25 to 24 count at the three-quarters mark. In the final period, Navy had the breaks and were warding off a fierce assault by the Ontario regiment as the final whistle sounded.

Navy guards Horner and Carter played an outstanding game, scoring 13 and 12 points respectively. The two Soo Suds recruits, Goodman and Doyle, fitted into the team line-up well. Goodman having arrived by vehicle from Terrace only 20 minutes before game time. Latovich, Weaver and Larkin were the team veterans and all three played a fine game.

Live Bait Herring Pound at Hunt's Inlet Prepares for Annual Harvest

While the herring harvest is now over in the most productive areas along the coast, the Laredo Sound district and more southern fishing grounds having been closed after a successful season. There is still one branch of the herring industry which has not yet reaped its annual quota of the small fish. This is the live bait industry which im-

pounds a part of the spring herring run which is sold to halibut fishermen months after the herring run is over.

Live herring bait is in heavy demand by halibut men during the season, being preferred to frozen bait, and is bought by the barrel at fancy prices. There are several herring pounds on the north coast. Nearest Prince Rupert is that operated by John and Michael McFadden at Hunt's Inlet on Porcher Island.

A herring pound is an enclosure made of floating boom logs from which mesh wire is draped down into the water forming a pen through which sea water can circulate but from which even small fish cannot escape. At spawning time schools of herring make an excursion into Hunt's Inlet and, while dallying in shallow in-shore waters, they are seined in nets and deposited into the pound. Here they live in captivity until the halibut men begin to call for live bait. A 200-pound barrel of bait herring brings the poundkeeper as much as a ton of herring sold for commercial purposes during the season.

However, everything is not beer and skittles for the poundkeepers. Last year, for instance, the McFadden brothers experienced a notable lack of co-operation on the part of the herring. With everything ready for the pound filling operation, they waited for the spawning run which would bring the fish into the inlet. The fish came, but stayed only a few hours instead

of the customary period of days and were gone before the fishermen could even dip a seine.

When the herring make a normal run, feverish activity prevails in the inlet. No one has yet persuaded the fish to operate on schedule or to give advance information on their movements. So while they are in the inlet the fishermen encircle them with seines and drag them to the pound where they are spilled into captivity. Normally between 300 and 400 tons are caught in this way.

At present a large school of herring is reported to be off Porcher Island and an air of expectancy prevails Hunt's Inlet.
