Sport Chat

Seventy-three year old Spring Morin a stable "boy" for 60 years, left his cottage before dawn, hurried to the stables and led out last year's Derby winner, Ocean Swell, for an early exercise. Before daylight he had groomed and fed one of the country's most valuable racing properties because Ocean Swell's triumph in the historic Derby jumped his value to something like \$135,000. Spring, so named because he never seems to age, and his helper, "Young" Harry Mallows, serve to accentuate the acute labor shortage in Britain's thoroughbred stables. Most young stable hands are either in the services or on war work. No one rightly knows "Young" Mallows' age. The best expert, Trainer Jack Jarvis, says Mallows is "well over 73—but how much, we do not know." Anyway Young Mallows never misses a morning at exercising the Jarvis string of yearlings in dawn gallops. And before he retires Mallows' ambition is to see one of those yearlings win the Derby. It was Spring Morin's greatest triumph when Ocean Swell won the Derby for Lord Roseberry. Spring was given the job of looking after the horse from the day he went into training and he is rated one of the best "stable boys" in the game.

A slim, grey-haired woman in black, who has tried without success for years to train a race winner, outbid several of Britain's outstanding turfmen to pay a record price of \$70,000 for the two-year old filly Carpatia, at Newmarket's annual bloodstock sales. The woman, Mrs. Florence Nagle, will train Carpatia, by Derby winner Hyperion out of Campanula, personally at Petworth in Sussex for next year's classic Oaks and other big races. Mrs. Nagle is well known on the British turf. Her best horse was Sandspire who ran second in the 1937 Derby. Earlier this year she paid \$38,000 for a colt. She rarely makes a wager on a horse, unless it is one of her own, and then only a modest sum "for sentiment's sake." Carpatia ran three times in Lady Bullough's colors at Newmarket this year, winning once and finishing second twice. Sale of Carpatia was one of the quickest on record. Bidding opened at \$28,000 and small, hatless Mrs. Nagle made her first offer at twice that figure. The Gaekwar or Baroda was the underbidder.

Fillics appeared to be most in demand at the sales. Trainer Fred Darling paid \$34,000 for Monsoon, second in this year's Oaks. Monsoon will go to stud. The British Bloodstock Agency gave \$28,000 for Bonny Ann, two-year old from Lord Roseberry's stables. Commando Leader Lord Lovat bought Harold, a yearling colt, for \$2,350.

ATTACKING
FORMOSA

PEARL HARBOR, Jan. 5.—The American Third Fleet is maintaining radio silence this morning. This may indicate that carrier planes are attacking Japanese installations in the Formosa area for the third straight day. Admiral Nimitz has disclosed only that Allied planes struck Tuesday and Wednesday against the enemy on Formosa and islands to the north.

It is also revealed this morning that during the first three days of the year Allied aerial raids on the island of Luzon in the Philippines resulted in the sinking or damaging of 60 enemy vessels.

IS PRIMATE
OF ENGLAND

King Nominates Bishop of London as Archbishop of Canterbury

LONDON, Jan. 5.—King George yesterday nominated Rt. Rev. Jeffrey Francis Fisher, Bishop of London, as the new Archbishop of Canterbury succeeding Dr. William Temple who died recently. The 57-year-old former schoolmaster, who has been only 12 years in the active clergy, will become Primate of All England. Fisher became Bishop of Chester in 1932 and Bishop of London in 1939. Usually the Archbishop of York succeeds to the Archbishop of Canterbury but on this occasion it is different.

Possibility of
Spies Landing

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—Commissioner S. T. Wood of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police yesterday warned that the Germans might attempt to land spies in Canada like was done in the United States. He asked Canadians to be on guard.

Commissioner Wood said that he did not suspect that any German spies had been landed in Canada so far.
