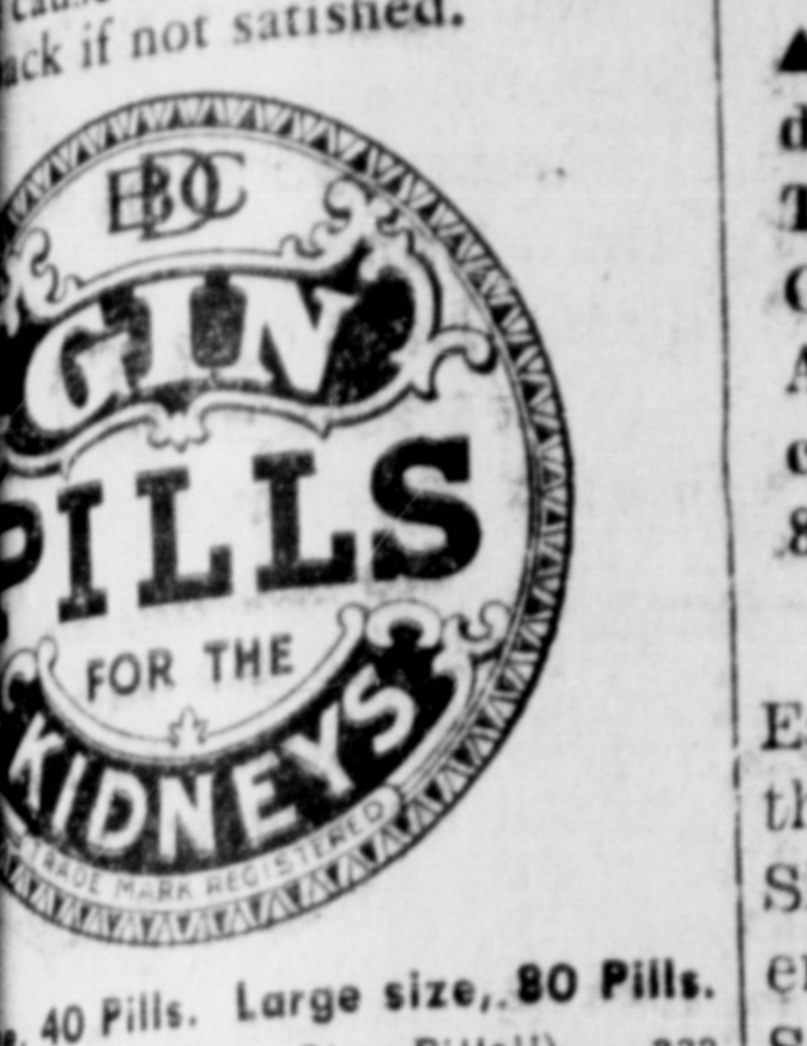

Reference is made to your letter of June 15th regarding C. D. Cameron of Skeena and E. D. Sim of Revelstoke.

We requested a ruling from head office regarding employment of white help on the Revelstoke project, and received the following quote: "It is departmental policy to use Japanese truck drivers and Japanese machine operators, when experienced Japanese can be obtained to fill these positions. Otherwise, preference should be given to returned or discharged soldiers over ordinary white help."

The letter has been and is at present, the policy of the Department.
