FINAL RITES FOR MRS. SANDISON

India Receptive To Church Work

MONTREAL (C)—The people of India now are more willing to listen to the teachings of Christian missionaries than they were before the war, Mrs. A. Earl Toombs, on leave from India, told the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Mrs. Toombs said one of the features most evident to western visitors to India was the disease and the deformity among children.

There are 1,000,000 lepers, and 1,500,000 of the population are blind.

Hindering the treatment of disease was fear which must be overcome by Christian teaching.

From 150,000 to 180,000 women die in childbirth every year and thousands of children under five die every year from unhygienic conditions.

Mrs. Toombs called for support to missions to aid in alleviating these conditions.

MISS MOONEY'S RESIGNATION

Relinquishing Position as Hospital Lady Superintendent

The newly-elected board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital received the resignation of the hospital lady superintendent, Miss Phyllis Mooney, R.N., as its first item of business when it met briefly following the annual meeting of the hospital association last night.

Miss Mooney's resignation was handed to President Clifford Ham within a matter of minutes after his election to that post by the other board members. Miss Mooney asked that it be effective on April 1.

President Ham and Vice President Arnold Flaten were appointed by the board to interview Miss Mooney to learn if she would not reconsider her resignation, which would further confuse the already serious staff problem at the hospital. The interview was scheduled for this afternoon.

No reason was given in Miss Mooney's letter as to her reason for leaving.
