Monthly Meeting Hears Reports—Entertainment Program

Reports presented at the Borden Street Parent-Teachers' Association session last evening, with the president, Mrs. George Howe, in the chair and a good number of members present, showed that the recent rummage sale had been most successful and a vote of thanks was accorded those responsible for its organization and gratifying results. The money was then made available to the principal for school purposes.

Resolutions for the annual convention of the Parent Teacher Federation were considered. Entertainment was provided by Mrs. A. T. Lashmar, whose rendering of two vocal solos delighted the listeners. Mrs. V. Seaman was accompanist.

A discussion on pupils' report cards was led by Principal J. S. Wilson. He discussed what should be expected in a report card. The ideal situation would be a continuous contact between the parents, teachers and children to ensure that the pupils were working to the best of their capacity.

The old report cards which indicated what each pupil's marks were told only part of the story and very often gave entirely wrong impressions, said the speaker. The new report cards indicated the considered judgment of the teacher on the pupil's accomplishments in the light of his powers. Moreover, the new card was far more comprehensive and gave a fuller and truer picture of the child's progress towards becoming a useful citizen.

The discussion showed that some parents felt that the former type of card had definite advantages and the ensuing exchange of views proved interesting and helpful.

Refreshments were served by a committee with Mrs. W. L. Lineham and Mrs. W. McLeod in charge.
