Impossible to Single Out Fifty Victims of Virginia Air Crash

NEW YORK ()-A common grave was a possibility today for thirteen victims of the Friday the thirteenth air disaster near Leesburg Va. as the investigators pressed a four-way inquiry into the crash which killed fifty pedsons. With 37 bodies identified authorities said the prospect for singling out others seems remote. Cause of the disaster remains a mystery.


