## SATURDAY SERMON

### NOT FAR FROM THE KINGDOM

(By REV. FRED ANTROBUS, First Baptist Church)  
"When Jesus saw that he answered discreetly, He said  
unto him, Thou art not far from the kingdom of God."

These words were spoken to a "scribe" who had  
asked a question about the greatest of the command-  
ments and to which Jesus had replied in effect that,  
if a man is to keep the greatest commandment, he  
must love the Lord his God, with his whole being,  
and his neighbor as he loves himself. Jesus com-  
mended this particular scribe for his discernment for he seem-  
ed to have understood some-  
thing of the spirituality of the  
law, and to have realized that  
the one bond between God and  
man was "love."

If he had followed out the  
knowledge he had of the inward-  
ness of the law, he would have  
been smitten with his own sin-  
fulness. If he had followed to  
its logical conclusion his per-  
ception that it was the bond of  
love which binds men to God  
and most closely to each other,  
he would have followed Jesus,  
who would not only have com-  
mended God's love to him but  
would have kindled within his  
heart His own love for God.

But there seems to have been  
a great separation between know-  
ing the right and doing the  
right. Many have true thoughts  
of what God requires of man,  
and also of His provision for  
our salvation, yet never come to  
repentance. If they did, their  
lives would be changed. One of  
man's greatest foes is the lazy  
way of thinking which many in-  
telligent, well-educated and in-  
formed people have, of putting  
off important decisions, think-  
ing that perhaps the mere pas-  
sage of time will make all things  
new.

One may find many people who  
seem to have sincere convictions,  
the only rational outcome of  
which is practical surrender to  
Jesus Christ in faith and love.  
They are on the verge of the  
"great surrender" but they re-  
main so, they hesitate, they wait  
for a "more convenient season"  
and succeed in perpetrating the  
"great refusal" instead. Their  
hearts are touched, they have  
nothing against the church.
