### TRACTOR USEFUL ON Q.C. ISLANDS

**SKIDEGATE**—A small caterpillar tractor, equipped with specially wide treads arrived recently and went to a ranch at Cape Ball River. This is the first tractor of this sort to come to the islands for farm use. It appears to be very suitable for operation on muck and peat lands and should solve the transportation difficulties of farmers up the east coast of Graham Island who have to use the beach for travel as it negotiates the softest spots on the Reclate Strait beach with ease and more expeditiously than horses could have done.
