Cruise Schedule for Chilcotin Announced—Week-end Shipping Here

Schedule of the Union Steamship Co.'s cruise ship Chilcotin for the coming summer season is announced. Starting early in June she will make weekly trips north from Vancouver to Prince Rupert and Ketchikan. Calling only at Alert Bay on the way north she will arrive here at 1:30 Monday afternoons and remain until 5:30 p.m., when she will sail for Ketchikan, cruising the entrance of Portland Canal enroute and arriving at Ketchikan 9 a.m. Tuesdays. Leaving Ketchikan at 3 p.m. Tuesdays, the Chilcotin will be back here at 10 p.m., sailing at midnight on the return voyage south, cruising Gardner Canal on Wednesday

mornings and calling at Ocean Falls on the way back to Vancouver. A converted Castle Class corvette identical to the Coquitlam and Camosun, the Chilcotin will be seen here for the first time when she brings in a Shrine ceremonial excursion party from Vancouver this Friday afternoon. Then she will make one voyage on the Vancouver-Ocean Falls-Prince Rupert-Ketchikan run next week in piece of the Camosun before going on her own cruise "run for the season." Officers of the Chilcotin will include Capt. Alex McLennan (who has been in command of the Camosun), Chief Engineer George Craigen (Lady Cynthia), Purser G. C. Foote (Cassiar) and Chief Steward Jack Mennies (Cardena).

Capt. Ole Skog, veteran seaboat and fish packing operator of Prince Rupert, leaves on tonight's train for a post-war visit to his native home in Trondhjem, Norway. He will sail May 29 from New York on the Norwegian-American liner Stavangerfjord, the same ship on which he made his last trip to his native home a few years before World War II. Capt. Skog's packer Thelma S., with his son, Harold Skog, in command, left on Thursday for New Westminster with a load of 62,000 lbs. of co-operative fish. The vessel has been chartered by the Co-operative to pack salmon into Prince Rupert this summer from the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Lynch in Dawson. They later went to Prince Rupert arriving the year the city was incorporated. Mr. Lynch became one of the early aldermen and operated a store there many years. Mrs. Lynch left no relatives and left her property to the Orthopedic Hospital.
