NEW PASTOR IS COMING

Rev. E. Soiland of Bellingham To Take Over Pulpit of St. Paul's Lutheran Church

Rev. E. Soiland is coming to Prince Rupert June 8 from Bellingham, Washington, to assume the pastorate of St. Paul's Lutheran Church here. He will be accompanied by his wife and daughter. Installation of Mr. Soiland to the local pulpit will be conducted June 15 by Bishop H. L. Foss of Bellingham. Rev. A. O. Aasen, who has been supply-

ing in St. Paul's here for the past year or so, is leaving for New York City where he will assume the ministry of Trinity Lutheran Church while the regular pastor, Rev. A. Schlotz, Mr. Aasen's son-in-law, goes to Lund, Sweden, to attend a world Lutheran convention.

SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

Southeastern Sailing Tonight—New Union Schedule—Southholm in Port

Loading of the new Briggs Steamship Co.'s motorship Southeastern, Capt. Alexander Barov, with cargo from the Middle West accumulated here after having been delivered by Canadian National Railways, was completed by last evening and the vessel will leave tonight for Ketchikan, Wrangell, Petersburg and Juneau. Being open to the public this afternoon, quite a few citizens took advantage of the opportunity to visit the ship with which they were favorably impressed.

Changes involving Union Steamship Co. sailings from Prince Rupert are announced. They are effective as from now. The steamer Catala will arrive Friday mornings from the south and sail at 5 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. The Coquitlam will arrive at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoons from Vancouver, sailing at 8 p.m. for Stewart and Alice Arm, which is being made a regular port of call, returning here Tuesday mornings to sail at 1:30 p.m. for the south. The schedule of the Camosun to Ketchikan remains unchanged while the Chilcotin will start next week on a special weekly six-day cruise north from Vancouver to Ocean Falls, Prince Rupert and Ketchikan with visits to such scenic waters as Portland and Gardner Canals.

Southbound from Alice Arm, where she unloaded 200 tons of machinery and lumber for Torbit Mine, the Frank Waterhouse freighter Southholm, Capt. Will-

iam Gleeson, docked here Sunday afternoon, stopping first at the Fairview Bay fishermen's floats where it unloaded 45,000 board feet of lumber for John Currie, contractor. The lumber will be used to complete the floats. Bright, dry weather in Prince Rupert probably will bring with it less dust when the city workmen spread calcium chloride on the streets. The anhydrous substance has the happy faculty of absorbing moisture from the air, and thus, when spread on the streets, reduces the blanket of dust ordinarily caused by traffic. After weeks of effort, the city managed to secure 18 tons of calcium chloride in Vancouver. It was delivered here Sunday on the freighter Southholm. The Southholm also delivered a small amount of lumber for Armour Salvage Co. and 5,000 bricks for Philpott, Eviatt, Co. Leaving here at midnight, Sunday, the Southholm stopped at B. C. Packers Port Edward plant, picking up 32,800 gallons of halibut oil for delivery to Imperial Cannery, Steveston. From Port Edward, the vessel went to North Pacific Cannery and Butedale to discharge cannery supplies, then to Ocean Falls to load a cargo of paper for Vancouver.

The Seattle fishpacker Einstoss, Capt. Saul Einstoss, was in port Monday unloading 2 carloads of frozen fish from Alaska for shipment over C.N.R. lines to the eastern United States.

After calling at the south Queen Charlotte Islands on Monday, Union steamer Cassiar was due to call at Butedale today to pick up 100 tons of frozen fish for Vancouver. The Cassiar sailed from here Sunday night for the south.

A member of the crew of the ss. Princess Louise died recently at Skagway. His name was Percy Jones, 59 and he passed away while at work in the ship's hold. The body was sent to Juneau from where it will be taken to Vancouver. It is understood the deceased had no relatives.

H.M.C.S. Uganda will be in Vancouver from June 9 to 11 with the University naval training division men aboard. The warship will return to Esquimalt June 11.

The salmon canning season is at hand, now that halibut fishing in Area 2 is about over. Gill-netting for spring salmon is under way and later there will be activity in sockeye, pink and chum operations. Sockeye runs have been depleted in the Fraser but a heavy run of pink salmon all along the coast is expected.
