### C.N.R. STILL IS UNBEATEN

Downed High School 4-3 in Rain-Halted Fastball

With an assist from the weather man the Canadian National Recreation Association fastball team preserved their unbeaten record when they edged out the High School nine by a score of 4-3 in six innings of a regular league game at the Gyro Ball Park last night.

In the first two innings both teams were retired in order with Wesch of High School striking out the first two batters to face him. The third man up walked but was caught off second base by a bullet throw from Catcher Jack Sharpe to Second Baseman Symes to retire the side.

Dunbar, on the mound for the railway men, struck out the first three batters and the first three men in the second inning also retired in order on an out-fly fly, an easy grounder and another strike-out.

In the third inning the High School lads came to life after the first two men up struck out. Wesch, on a single was advanced by Shier's bust down the third base line which was bobbed by Hunter on third base for CNRA. Hunter's throw to first was wild and Shier scampered for second. Meanwhile, Wesch was breezing

into third. When Nixon fired the ball into the stands behind third base, Wesch scored standing up as Hunter retrieved the ball and heaved it in the general direction of home plate in an abortive attempt to catch Shier at the plate, and two runs were in.

Two more errors in this inning allowed Forman and Forbes to occupy third and second respectively but Dunbar struck out Hartwig to retire the side. High School pushed over one more run in the fifth inning on three singles and another error to end their scoring.

In CNRA's half of the fourth inning two walks put Tschabald and Berner on the sacks and Schwab's two bagger drove them both across the plate. The Railway men pushed over another single run in the fifth inning on Nixon's second consecutive single of the evening, an in-field fly and a single by Tschabald. Two hits and one error in the sixth accounted for CNRA's final tally.

As the students stepped to bat in their half of the sixth it was toss up between the ball game and the rain. When Lavigne, Symes and Kennedy went out in order, the weather man took over and umpire London called off the game. The official verdict on the game was CNRA 4, High School 3.

### STAMPS PAY FOR COLLEGE

50-Year old Stamps Found on Back of Picture Are Worth \$2,500

TORONTO. — One hundred stamps concealed in an old picture that was rescued from the ash-heap are helping to pay for a civil engineering course at the University of Toronto for Jack Wright, a war veteran now in the second year of the course.

The stamps, discovered by chance, proved to be an unperforated sheet of Canadian postage stamps issued in 1898 and now valued in Canada at \$2,500. The sheet was hidden in the back of an old picture.

Wright didn't know their value until a stamp collector recognized them as part of an issue to commemorate imperial penny postage, the year the rate became the same all over the British Empire. They show the map of the world with the British possessions in red and the inscription "We Hold A Vaster Empire Than Has Been."

Those on the market today, the majority of them cancelled, are perforated and worth about 10 cents each.

A London stamp collector listed a pair of the unperforated stamps at \$80. A New York catalogue lists them at \$50 a pair. Wright believes the stamps will be sold in pairs and said: "I will take about a year to sell them all—but I can wait."

"The special boards might be easier but I manage fine this way," he said.
