SATURDAY SERMON

AN ACORN AND A PUMPKIN

(By REV. JOHN LINNEY, Full Gospel Tabernacle)

Two men were under an oak tree one day, one of them lying on his back on the ground. They were talking about God in whom one believed and the other did not.

The latter said "Look at this big tree, full of silly little acorns, while a vine that creeps on the ground bears a great big pumpkin. I would have made it just the other way."

As he spoke, an acorn dropped from the tree and the sharp end of it struck the eye of the speaker causing him some pain.

While he was exclaiming over it, his friend quietly said: "What if that had been a pumpkin?" The falterer had no answer to give. The only real answer is this: "And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good." (Gen. 1:31).

One of the most important things in life is, not where we stand but in what direction we are going. The believer walks with God and at the end of life's way will be transported into His presence. Heaven's best is being prepared for those who serve God's Son here in this life and share with Him the shame of the Cross. As the Christian contemplates where he will spend eternity there is joy and peace overflowing in his soul, and deep in his heart he says: "Thank God for such a Saviour. My sins are blotted out I know."

There are many unbelievers who sincerely desire to become believers. Others may have honestly taken their stand and failed and have become discouraged. Such might expect too much all at once. The life of fellowship with God cannot be built up within one day, but we can have a wonderful beginning in assurance of sins forgiven and the knowledge of eternal life.

God will vindicate His Word if we pray the publican's prayer from the heart. "God be merciful to me a sinner" and mean it. "All have sinned and come short of the glory of God." (Rom. 3:23).

"The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Rom. 6:23).

"If we confess our sins He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 Jn. 1:9).

"The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin." (1 Jn. 1:7).

"But as many as received Him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believeth on His name." (Jn. 1:12).

Faith in God's Word will cause Heaven's glory to burst in upon the soul. The very nature of faith calls for a test. C. H. Spurgeon says: "The blows of the trial of tribulation are not given in sport but in real earnest." The Lord tries the very life of our faith—not its beauty and its strength alone but its very existence. The iron enters into the soul; or the man's real self is made to endure the trial. The trial of our faith worketh experience, and experience hope. Affliction is useful in that we discover how much faith we have in God.

It is good to know that there is a limit to affliction. It is for the moment. It has its appointed period. Not always will the seas be tempestuous. God weighs and measures, and soon there is a calm. It is good to know that there is a coronation after affliction. It is the prelude to an eternal weight of glory. There are notes and chords in our very song which never could have been there if "I had not discovered in my trouble the grace of the Father, the sympathy of the Son and the power of the Holy Ghost."

JOHN MURRAY LAID AT REST

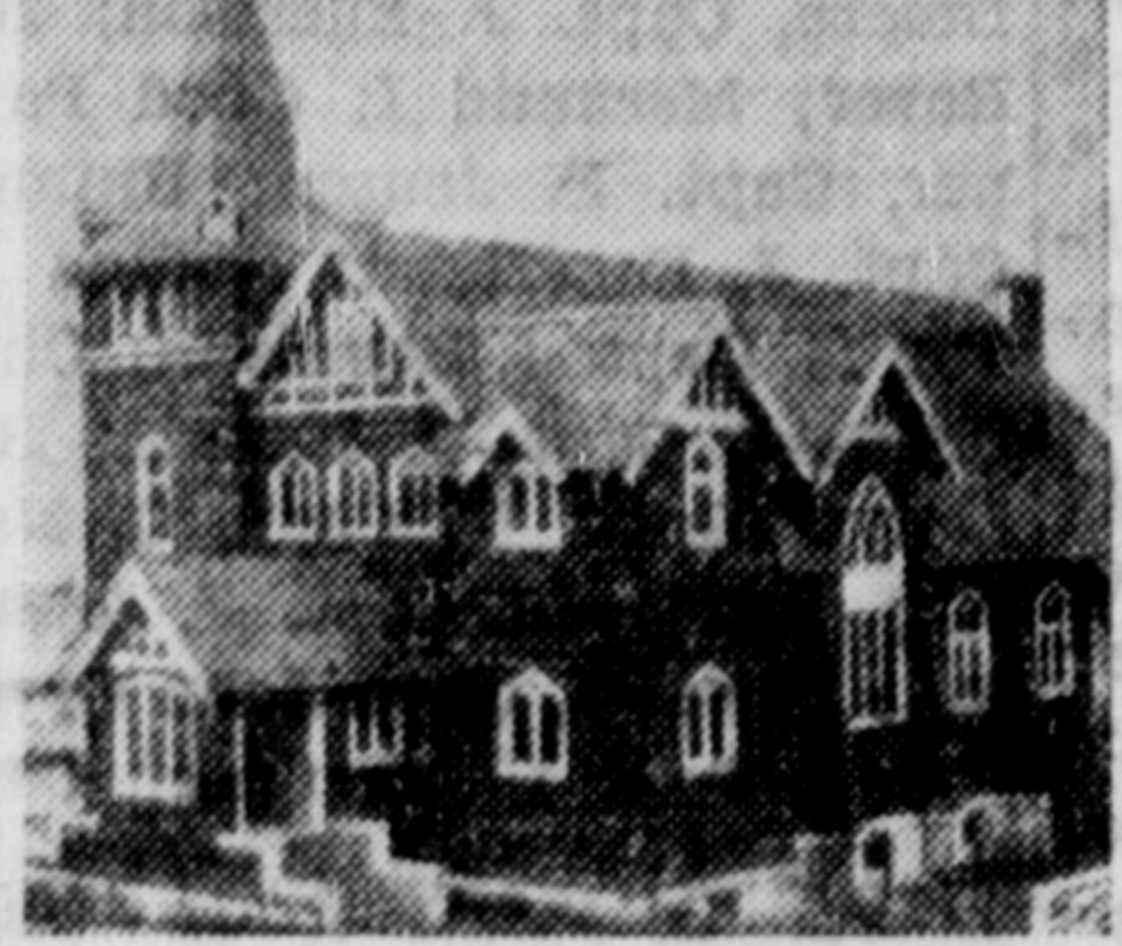
The hymns were "O God Our Help In Ages Past," and "Lead Kindly Light." Miss Gwen McRae was organist.

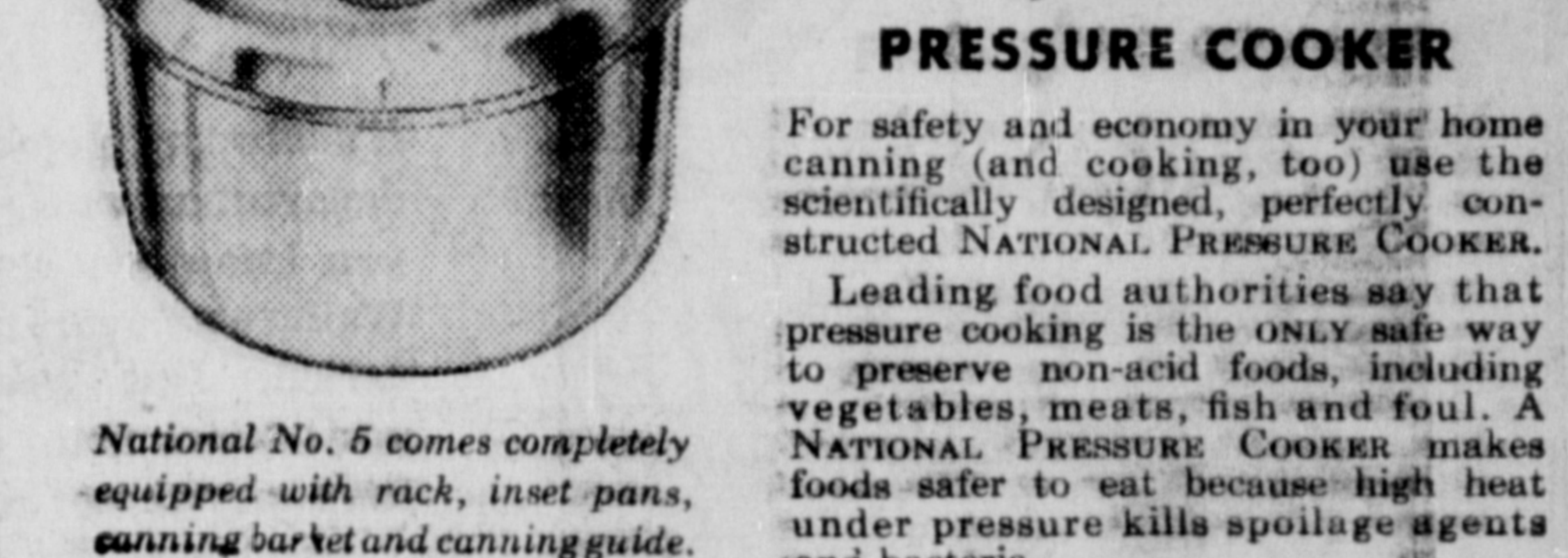
