Native people from the Naas River, Port Simpson and elsemore strong and in as many as the mouth of the Naas River for the annual harvest of the engineer of the Yukon & White delicate oolichan fish, some of

which have reached Cow Bay here to be dispensed direct from the boats. Yearly at this time, the natives gather at Fishery Bay for the infallible oolichan run. These fish, rendered into grease and some dried, are traditionally important part of the natives' store of food.
