Freer Trade Needed

NE of the most important factors affecting the tuture trade and consequent employment in Canada will be the decisions arrived at in the Geneva conference on world trade.

The nation which will hold the key to a freer trade policy throughout the world is the United States. The American policy is announced as being one of freeing trade by tariff reductions.

But with their existing high tariffs, even a 50 per cent cut will do but little to stimulate the huge flow of trade required to put the world on its feet, to the end that consumption can be increased tremendously in every country, the standards of living
