TODAY'S STOCKS NEW DEAL ON POLICE

Boost of \$2,400 Above Contract In Effect For Last Four Years

City Council last night ratified the signing of a new agreement with the provincial police covering policing of the city for DUE MAY 19 1947 at a cost of \$20,692-an increase of \$2,400 annually over the contract which had been in effect since 1943.

The aldermen authorized the Mayor and City Clerk to sign the agreement after the police committee had met with Police Commissioner T. W. S. Parsons, Pyamaster Inspector D. D Moses and Divisional Inspector H. H. Mansell.

A new agreement with the city was requested by the provincial police last fall on grounds that rising costs had made greater contract charges necessary for municipal policing. Council deferred preparation

of a new agreement until Commissioner Parsons visited the city, allowing discussions of the local aspects. The increase also touches other municipalities policed by the provincial force. However, the boost from \$18,-254 to \$20,692, may be partially


