
Advertising Man For Daily News

Hundreds Thru T.B. Van Here

Three hundred persons—pupils fifteen years and over teachers and other staff members—went through the tuberculosis mass survey van in the quick time of two hours at Booth Memorial High School Monday afternoon. The examination was carried out with efficiency and dispatch by the new simplified process which calls for no undressing.

Yesterday morning the unit was at Cow Bay where 211 waterfront business people and residents of the area went through. Yesterday afternoon the van was at Seal Cove where 106 were examined. Today the unit took up its station in the lane to the rear of the Post Office where it will remain until June 17.

The effective organization of citizens for appointments in advance is contributing much to the volume and dispatch of the clinic's work here.


