CAPE TOWN (AP)—Doctors here operating on a patient obviously suffering from appendicitis received a rude shock when after the incision was made, they found there was no appendix on the right side. The patient was a 24-year-old typist. Normally it takes only a few minutes to find the appendix. The doctors

searched for 25 minutes before they found it—on the left side, a phenomenon encountered once in 250,000 cases. The young woman was found to have what is known as a transposition of the viscera. Her heart was on the right side instead of the left. The operation was a success and the patient is recovering.

Tiny Sea Cannibals Turn Oysters Green

MONCTON, N.B. (AP)—If you should be faced some day with a green oyster, don't panic, eat it—if you like oysters. The chances are it will be especially tasty. The color scheme is merely the result of plentiful plankton.

This is the advice of Ott Hicks in the Moncton Transcript.

"Plankton," says Mr. Hicks, "are forms of drifting or floating organic life—infinitesimal living things—found in the ocean. There are different types of plankton and the relationship between them is essentially unfriendly—they eat each other. Not that that gets them any place since they are in turn gobbled up by other forms of ocean-life, such as oysters, trout and salmon."
