Almost every man in town turned volunteer to battle the flames and the steamer Grommet Reefer moved from a nearby mill dock to the scene to aid in saving the cannery dock.

Some trap and cannery equipment, a bunkhouse and mess hall were also saved by the large volunteer crew.
