British Columbia Should Get Same Concessions As Are Given To Maritimes

Mayor McGeer Critical of Both Canadian National and Canadian Pacific -Former Should Be Public Utility

VANCOUVER (CP)—Objections to an increase in freight rates came from fish processing and distributing trades Wednesday, before the hearing here. The Maritime Freight Rates Act of 1927 was brought into the hearing when James S. Eckman, spokesman for the fish trade, declared the west coast should re-

*ceive advantages similar to those conferred on eastern shippers by the enactment. The M.F.R.A. provides 20 per cent reductions in freight rates on certain traffic moving through the maritimes with a view to making. central Canadian markets more accessible to the maritime shippers. Carriers are reimbursed by the federal government sub-

Mayor G. G. McGeer also advocated subsidies for British Columbia similar to those accorded the Maritimes. Instead, all British Columbia had was the mountain differential.
