Twenty-Two Nazis Hanged Yesterday-More Today

LANDSBERG, Germany (P) -Twenty-two operators of the infamous Nazi concentration camp at Mauthausen were hanged yesterday with twenty-seven others scheduled to follow them today in the biggest mass executions of war criminals yet carried out by any Allied power. All were 4 convicted by the American War Crime Court hearing of the murders and atrocities committed against prisoners in the big camp near Linz where more than 700,000 Nazi victims are alleged to have been exterminated.

The huge herds, valued at than \$100,000,000 are guarded by Dominion Fisheries patrol vessels as they pass through Canadian waters.

MORE EXECUTIONS LANDSBERG, Germany -United States Army executioners hanged more than 26 Elite Guard administrators of the infamous Mauthausen concentration camp today, completing the executions of 48 camp guards and foremen for war crimes. Twenty-two had been hanged yesterday in two hours and 37 minutes.
