

### SERVICE FOR EMPIRE DAY

Inspiring Message for I.O.D.E. Members by Rev. F. Antrobus

A warm May sun shed its brilliance upon members of local Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, who attended First Baptist Church Sunday morning as an observance of Empire Day.

The church hall was daintily adorned with apple blossoms and a variety of flowers in their various hues. A large flag fell in folds above and to the right of the pulpit.

As the service opened, Mrs. S. V. Cox, Mrs. M. G. Keays, and Mrs. V. Grant, flag-bearers, stood facing the audience before placing the flags upright at the head of each aisle.

An especially acceptable contribution was made to the morning worship by the junior choir which sang "Waiting For You" after which Ross and Maxine Martin sang a duet entitled "Back of The Clouds."

The address which followed was an inspiration to both young and old. Rev. Fred Antrobus called to remembrance the many empires which have risen and

fallen. In each instance, he pointed out, national decay followed a national turning away from God. "But," said Mr. Antrobus, "a nation is composed of individual characters. Therefore, let each of us beware lest active faith toward God cease or become a casual, diminishing part of our lives."

In conclusion, those present were called upon to remember that in a time not far distant the British Empire was saved from destruction when armed forces and their supplies were at the lowest state. Only the living faith of many who remembered The All-Powerful in that day were able to understand why the enemy did not sweep forward.
