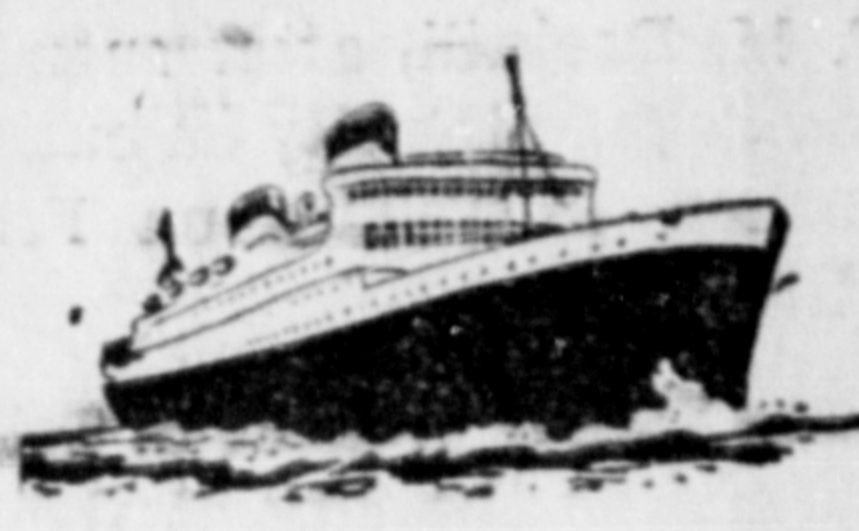

Halibut Fishing in Area No. 2 Ends—Chilcotin Inaugurates New Run

Halibut fishing in this area came to the end of the season for 1947 at midnight last night but landings will continue from this area during the next week or so. The season was a short and a busy one, with Prince Rupert getting the great bulk of the business in comparison with the ports of Vancouver and Seattle. In 1939, the Area No. 2 season lasted for 42 days. This year, it had been reduced, in length of time, to 39 days. Fishing from Area No. 3, so far little touched, of course, continues.

Operating on a revised time table which eliminates some of the calls between Vancouver and Prince Rupert and adds Alice Arm to Stewart and other points on the turn north of here, Union steamer Coquitlam, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 4:30 yesterday afternoon from the south, sailing north at 8 p.m. The vessel is due back here tomorrow morning and will sail at 1:30 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

With a full list of passengers, comprising mostly round trip tourists, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. Graham Hughes, arrived in port at 9:30 this morning from Vancouver and sailed at noon for Alaska ports whence she is due back here Saturday afternoon southbound.

Friday afternoon saw two Union coastal liners in port in quick succession. Camosun, Capt. Harry McLean, arrived in port at 4 p.m. and sailed at midnight for Ketchikan when she was back Saturday evening south-

bound. Catala, Capt. Ernest Sheppard, arrived at 5 p.m. from the south via coast cannery points and left two hours later on her return to Vancouver.

Inaugurating Union Steamships new coastal cruise for tourist pleasure, the new steamer Chilcotin, Capt. Alex McLennan, is due in port at 4:30 this afternoon from Vancouver and Alert Bay with a full list of marine holiday makers and will sail later in the afternoon to make a cruise part way up Portland Canal this evening before heading for Ketchikan where six hours will be spent tomorrow. Late tomorrow evening the Chilcotin will call here to enter and clear as she makes her return cruise south.

Ketchikan motorship Sidney was in port from 4 to 11:30 p.m.

Whaler Swamped By Gust of Wind

A strong gust of wind swamped a Sea Cadet whaler which Midshipman Leonard Youngman and Charles Currie were sailing in the harbor at 1 o'clock this afternoon, throwing both boys into the water. They were rescued by a nearby packer shortly afterward, apparently unharmed. The half-sunken boat and the two Sea Cadets were brought to shore by a small boat which put out from the government dock.
