May go to England—Navy League in Session

A well-attended meeting of the Prince Rupert Branch, Navy League, was held at the Civic Centre Tuesday evening, S. P. Woodside, chairman, presiding, and a fair number of parents of sea cadets and Navy League members in attendance.

It was reported that final arrangements have been completed by the Navy League of Canada for the sending of a party of Canadian Sea Cadets to England for the summer months. Two cadets are to be sent from British Columbia. In order that the local corps may have a chance to be represented, it was decided at the meeting that corps Commander Alex Mitchell should nominate several of the local cadets to appear before a local examining board consisting of Capt. J. R. Elfert, Commander Orme Stuart and Corporal Lashmar. The cadet chosen by this board will be sent to Vancouver, at the expense of the local Navy League, where, with other representatives of other B.C. corps, he will appear before an examining board of retired naval officers and Navy League officials, which board will choose the two successful British Columbians.
