Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

DAIRYINGLY DELICIOUS; MILK IS MAN'S MOST IMPORTANT FOOD

Too often reason is brushed aside and menu-planning is influenced by the likes and dislikes of the various members of the family. To contribute to the health and happiness of the family, the homemaker must serve meals based on a sound foundation. Milk has long been called man's most nearly perfect food. It contains many of the essential food elements in a very convenient and readily digestible form.

Milk is in a class of its own when it comes to furnishing the needed minerals to build strong teeth and bones. No other food may be substituted for it. It is the finest food known for children and should be an important item on their menu during the growing years.

Since milk is a perishable product, it should be kept under refrigeration at all times. Once it has been delivered it should be immediately brought in, the bottle wiped off with a clean, damp cloth and placed in the refrigerator, where the temperature is between 40 degrees F. and 45 degrees F. Never allow a partially filled milk bottle to stand around at room temperature—always replace in the refrigerator at once to prevent scouring. Milk also absorbs food flavors and should be stored covered, away from strong odors.

There are various types of milk available. Pasteurized milk is sold in many places. Pasteurization is a method of applying heat to destroy disease germs, which may be contained within the milk, and is therefore a means of safe-guarding the health of the consumer. Homogenized milk has been treated to distribute the fat globules uniformly throughout and upon standing they will not separate out. Butter milk sold commercially is usually prepared from skim milk and chemically does not differ from that which remains when butter is churned from cream. The food value is about the same as that of skim milk. It is easily digested and with its characteristic flavor has become the favorite of many home makers both as a drink and for cooking purposes.

It is often hard to get children, as well as grownups, to take even a portion of their daily milk quota as milk. The reason is not hard to find. Plain milk always looks and tastes exactly the same and soon becomes monotonous. However, there are innumerable ways in which milk may be served in the menu, such as cream soups, sauces, scalloped dishes, scuffles, custards, puddings, sherberts and ice cream. Another way of serving milk, which is particularly popular with children is as milk drinks. In these the milk takes on a new color and added flavor and to drink it becomes a real pleasure.

Home economists suggest these recipes for appetizing, nourishing and refreshing milk drinks to serve with summer meals.

Cocoa Syrup for Milk Drinks. 1 cup cocoa OR 2 squares unsweetened chocolate; melted. Pinch of salt

1/2 cup of sugar, 1 cup of water, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Mix cocoa, sugar and salt. Add water and boil 5 minutes. Cool and add vanilla. Store in a jar in the refrigerator. Makes approximately 1 cup syrup.

To make Chocolate Milk Drink. Stir: 1 tablespoon syrup into a glass of cold milk.

Maple Milk. 1 cup milk, 2 tablespoons maple syrup. Mix well and serve hot or cold.

Grape Blossom. 1 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice, 1/2 cup grape juices. Mix well and serve cold.

LIFE in this Prince Rupert by BIDDEE JINKS

In the silence of complete and awful embarrassment, I was reminded of a similar moment many years gone. Of my mother standing pink-cheeked and distraught before a small boy. It was my brother, just returned from an errand to an adjoining farm.

The errand was one common enough where neighbors are neighborly—and where every so often a woman finds herself out of bread. Our household being no exception, it had, therefore, been expedient, on the previous day, to borrow a loaf from "Hazel," a stout, good-natured woman whose unpainted dwelling was but a few rods down the road.

Hazel's bread was never a prize-winner. In this locality where loaves were large and light, hers were small and of considerable weight. But this day had been a fragrant bake day in our kitchen and a loaf had been duly sent to Hazel. A bare-foot boy had delivered it and returned again, kicking up small spurts of warm dust at every step. "Hazel said you shouldn't maybe have sent back a loaf, Mama," he said as he took the long-handled dipper off its hook. "She said maybe her bread wasn't very good."

"And what did you say, son?" asked mother apprehensively, her hands suddenly still. "Oh, I said to never mind, Hazel. We didn't eat it anyway—just threw it out to the pigs, I said!"

But this was different. This was my son and me! And it had nothing to do with bread, but with the dessert.
