

Russia proposed that the Four Power council of foreign ministers meet again to consider the Berlin crisis and the whole German situation. The proposal was contained in a note in reply to western power notes of September 26, breaking off the Four Power negotiations and announcing that the question would be taken to the United Nations security council.

The Russian note said that the United States government's statement that a situation threatening world peace had arisen did not correspond with the real state of affairs. It said that this charge constituted nothing more than means of pressure and an attempt to use the United Nations for the achievement of aggressive aims.

The Russians claim that the United Nations security council has no right to deal with the Berlin dispute.
