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Progress of Phone Work

Ruling of the inspector of electrical energy that no new telephone line construction can be placed on power poles carrying more than 7,500 volts have made it necessary to re-route the telephone line renewal leading through Cow Bay to the waterfront area under the city's general reconstruction program. Accordingly, an additional cost of \$952 is entailed in the project by carrying the line for a distance of fifty feet under Cow Bay and the city council, at its meeting Monday night, on recommendation of the utilities committee, made an appropriation of that amount to provide for the installation of the submarine cable. In addition, there will be an estimated additional cost of \$1500 for labor. The general route of this line is from McBride Street along First Avenue, hitting Cow Bay at the Northern B.C. Power Co. sub-station and going from there under Cow Bay to the railway track at the mouth of the bay.

The telephone superintendent reported as follows to the city council Monday night on other projects of the telephone cable reconstruction program:

Reconstruction of Eighth Avenue temporarily held up waiting for the Power Company to change enue West to Comox Avenue is poles. Ninth Avenue West to Comox Avenue is completed except for splicing. Cost to date for material on the Ninth Avenue West-Comox Street project is \$1,296.07 with \$111.36 costs for labor. The original estimate was \$1616 for material and \$992 for labor.

Rushbrook Heights project is expected to be completed by the end of the year. Job allotment for this work was \$4,005, but only \$970.75 for material and \$860.12 for labor has been expended to date.

The Herman Street to Canadian Fish & Cold Storage project is being deferred until next year.

A project not included in the original estimate was that of moving a cable at Booth Memorial School. Estimated at \$1000, this job was carried out at a cost of \$716.28.

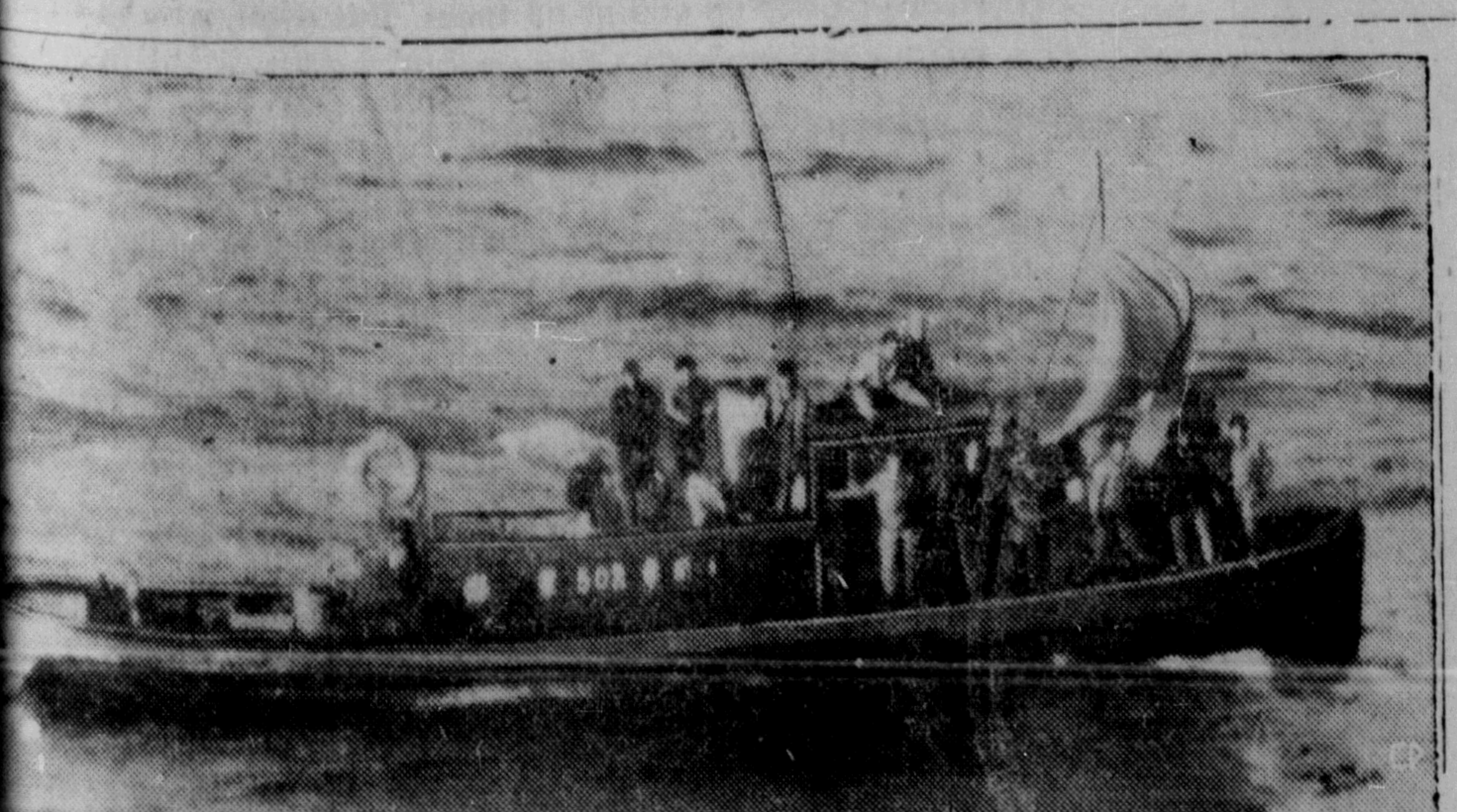
