With bonspiels all over the country breaking entry records, curling has been enjoying popularity that has never been exceeded, but it is hard to imagine modern curlers having enough enthusiasm for the "roarin' game" that they would use wooden curling rocks or curl by the light of a stable lantern. Yet that is just what was done back in 1907 in the small Saskatchewan town of Saltcoats. At the official opening of the Yorkton, Sask., bonspiel recently, Alderman Art McBurney heaved a five-pound, 41-year-old wooden rock down the ice and lost a nickel bet for failing to make

the button. Frank Garstone, who brought the wooden rock from Saltcoats to Yorkton, related that it was washed up on the nearby lakeshore last spring and that it was one of 16 made in 1907 when the Saltcoats rock tossers urled on the lake by the light stable lanterns. Garstone says that the rock was made with a draw-knife and rasp by Jim Kerr, the village blackmith. Kerr and two brother Scots made an after-dark raid on timber which the railway was using for bridge pilings. The wooden rock was originally aced with a tine plate and to give it a keen surface was polished with stove lead.

The story goes that in 1907 he Saltcoat curlers, after many practice with their wooden ocks, attended the Northwest "erritories bonspiel at Yorkon and won a final 18-end game o take home the winning prize. hey used borrowed granites or the occasion.
