CANADA UP AGAINST FIFTH COLUMN

Sooner or later we will have to tell them where to stop. "I am not impressed with the Russian ability to fight," asserted Hladun. "They have not the industry to sustain war because it is on a faulty economic basis. Of course, we are not in much of a position to wage war ourselves."

"You cannot drive a bargain with these Russians either. Nor can you appease them for they will not reciprocate."

"Our business must be to clean out this fifth column and render it impotent."

"What we must do is stabilize the great middle class of

people, assuring them that our way of life, while it may be abused, is still based on the best philosophy of life, that we are all shareholders in the business of our country and have our responsibilities to see that it is improved. There can never be that cherished privilege of freedom under dictatorship. We, as Canadians, must realize that, while our own system may not be perfect, we have at least something that has never been excelled."

"Our problem is simply to knock out the penetration of a foreign power which has nothing whatever to offer us and whose only aim is to append us to their own benefit."

"If we put our shoulders to the wheel and really meet the

situation, Communism can be rendered no problem in Canada within six months," the speaker declared. "Nor should we make it a 'witch hunt' or a 'scalping affair.' What we should do is tell our own people what the Communists really are. If we are responsible and dignified Canadians we can surely handle our own affairs without having agents of a foreign imperialism tell us what to do."

Hladun told of steps which were now being taken under government auspices, following the revelations of the espionage trials, which were just scratching the surface, to organize against the world-wide movement to undermine the present way of living. There had been some difficulty in ascertaining just where the labor movement ended and the fifth column began. It was well known, however, that the Communist party was at the service of Russia and its state police. Rather than outlaw the party, driving it underground and making martyrs of its members, it had been decided that the best way was to expose them. Once they were thoroughly exposed, there would be nothing to the party. One of the difficulties, however, was that the Communist party influence had now infiltrated to Canadian-born whereas first it had been among the foreign.

Articles solidly backed by evidence

In the national campaign against this so-called Commu-

nist infiltration he was one of the active organizers, Mr. Hladun revealed. He spoke of the sensational articles of revelation which he had written for Maclean's Magazine, all statements in which were backed to the hilt with evidence. It was his present task to study reaction throughout the country and, on his return to Ottawa, he would meet with the government and Members of Parliament to discuss legislation. Canadian Clubs, service clubs, Canadian Legion and such organizations were actively co-operating.

Hladun spoke of Tim Buck and the poor showing he had made in the West, particularly at the University of British Columbia meeting in Vancouver. "I don't think you'll see Tim Buck back in the west," he declared.

Speaking of the actual weakness of Russian industry, Hladun declared that in Russia the government had said there was no lend-lease but that war goods from United States, Canada, etc., without which Russia could not have fought, had been made in Russia. Even today the Russian government admitted that conditions in Russia were not good but that they were worse in other countries of the world and the Russians had better be contented.

The rank and file of the Communists might have been captivated by Communist propaganda which appealed to laziness and
