United Front

CANADA'S major political parties face the increasingly critical international situation with a united front as indicated in statements published yesterday from Mr. Drew, leader of the Progressive-Conservative party, and Mr. Coldwell, leader of the C.C.F., approving the United Nations action in Korea and assuring their support in carrying it out. With the Social Credit party already on record, that makes the whole thing pretty unanimous. That is as it should be and was, of course, to be expected but it is satisfactory, nevertheless, to see everybody on record.

In Britain the Laborites, the Conservatives and Liberals are, of course, in similar accord, assurances along this line having already been made.

Over there, of course, they must still have their little political fun as witness the "peanut division" Tuesday when the Conservatives forced a division on the government's East African peanut growing scheme which did seem somewhat of an incongruous situation in these serious days.

FAIRNESS

RECEIVING an honorary degree from an American university, Prime Minister St. Laurent took the occasion to make some remarks about the public treatment of public men. After saying that one of the most important of democratic freedoms is the freedom to oppose the policies of the administration, Mr. St. Laurent went on to say: "But it is quite another thing to attack the good faith, the honesty of purpose and the loyalty to their country of public men, when there is no substantial evidence to support such attacks."

One may agree with the Prime Minister's feeling in this matter and yet feel that he was not addressing the right audience. For the most part, those who are prone to impugn the loyalty and good faith of public men are themselves public men of other political faiths. The Prime Minister's sermon might fruitfully be delivered to his colleagues in the House of Commons.

Some members of all parties have been known to indulge in the cheap demagoguery of attack and misrepresentation on motives. Such tactics may gain a temporary advantage for the politician who stoops to use them but in the long run they only discredit the existing political system.

NEW GAME

HERE is a fascinating game that is not sweeping the country. It is amusing; requires no physical or mental effort; may be played anywhere, alone or in a crowd; costs nothing; no equipment needed. Nothing is at stake in this game except your life. It is a new game, as so few have played it that it is not worn out at all.

All that is needed to win in this game is to do whatever occurs to you as being the best thing. You will know what occurs to you as being the best, so you are the referee, and you chalk your score up accordingly, one point for doing your best, and one point off for not.

Later on, years later, maybe, you may find that your hunch of what was the right thing to do turns out to have been wrong; but do not count this against yourself. Life will count it against you and dock you for it, if, because of your parents, or your associates, or yourself, or because of plain hard luck you could not know at any moment what was the best course to take. But in this game, which has been played so little it is new, the score goes by whether or not you act on your most exalted impulse. If you do not, you dock yourself and life will probably take off some more points besides. But if you do the best you can manage, you mark up a point for yourself in this engrossing game. And you will may find as the years go on that life, too, builds you up quite a tally of good things.

By ELMORE PHILPOTT MOSCOW'S MISTAKE ON MY RECENT

visit to the Northwest Institute of International Relations I had the opportunity to size up a typical group of intelligent Americans.

Even for a friendly Canadian, who knows the great U.S.A. well, it has been hard, in the past few years, to know where Uncle Sam was going.

Were the Americans becoming warmongers, imperialists, militarist-minded? Granted the obvious fact that Communist Russia's policies of the past few years had been increasingly provocative—how much of this was due to reaction against the "crowding" or "closing in" of Uncle Sam or Uncle Joe?

These were the questions that I had asked myself over and over again. What were the ordinary, decent American people thinking about it all?

THIS IS HOW I SIZED-UP the large and representative group with whom I came in contact on my U.S. trip.

The Americans now know that the position of world leadership has been thrust on them by events. They have been extremely reluctant to accept that fact, in all its consequences. Deep down in every American's heart is a longing to go back to the "good old days" when he could live in peace in "God's country," blissfully indifferent to happenings overseas.

But, bit by bit, the American people have come to the realization that they can't go back to the "good old days" any more than an over-fifty man or woman can go back to school-days.

IT SEEMS TO ME THAT THE Americans went through one of the greatest national temptations that was ever presented to any strong power. For a brief period they had the monopoly of the atomic bomb. Their leaders, like those of Russia, were convinced that a stern struggle was inevitable between the two super-powers.

Why not atomize the Kremlin, and the great war industries of Russia? These were the questions that military and other leaders talked about a few years ago. Why not forestall the otherwise probable attack by Russia?

AS I TRIED TO SHOW years ago, there were overwhelming military reasons against such a course — chief being that the Red army could have swept

across western Europe in a matter of days.

But what ruled out such a plan of super-murder was the nature of the American people. Everyone who knew them was well aware that they would not have "gone along" with their leaders in any such outrageous act.

There is no certainty yet as to the outcome of the Communist aggression against southern Korea. But even if the Communist armies should sweep to complete local victory, Moscow's rulers would lose far more than they have gained.

For what they have done is to harden the hearts of the American people, of ALL schools of politics.

Uncle Joe Stalin's warmakers have done what Uncle Sam's few warmongers could not do—convinced the ordinary guy that the time has come to draw a line beyond which no aggressor can go without a fight.

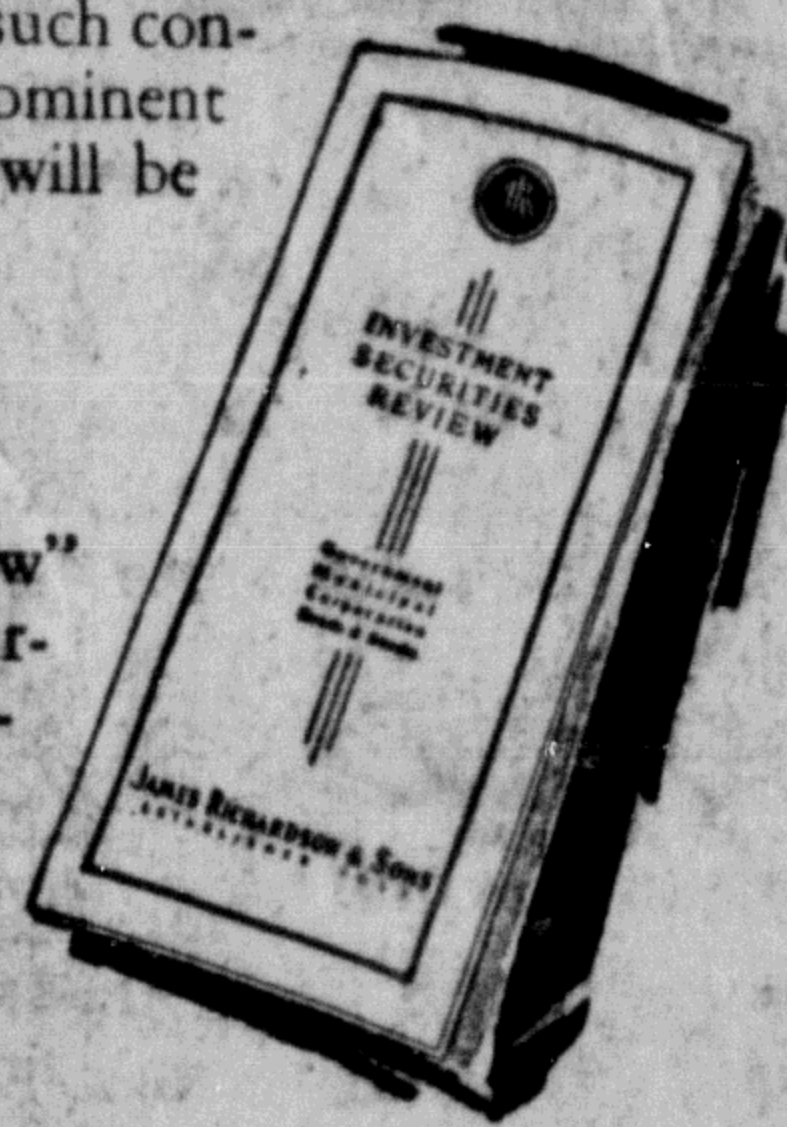

LEMON MERINGUE PIE

6 Tablespoons Canada Corn Starch
1 Teaspoon Salt
1 Cup Sugar
3 Cups Water

3 Egg Yolks
2 Tablespoons Butter
5 Tablespoons Lemon Juice
1 1/2 Teaspoons Grated Lemon Rind

3 Egg Whites
6 Tablespoons Sugar
1 9-inch Baked Pie Shell

Mix Canada Corn Starch, salt and 1/2 cup of the sugar in top of double boiler. Gradually add water. Place over boiling water; cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Cover and cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Do not

remove from heat. Stir a small amount of hot mixture into egg yolks which have been mixed with the remaining 1/2 cup sugar. Immediately pour back into remaining hot mixture over boiling water; blend thoroughly. Cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; add butter, lemon juice and rind. Cool to room temperature without stirring.

Pour into baked pie shell. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry; gradually beat in sugar. Spread meringue lightly on filling. Bake in moderate oven (325°F.) 15 to 20 minutes or until delicately browned.
