Picnic Meals



On the beach, in the country, or in your own back yard, picnics are part and parcel of summertime. You may have a family that enjoy a hot meal outdoors, cooked over campfire or barbecue pit, or you may have a lazy-day gang who prefer munching fruit, sandwiches and cookies under a shady tree.

Whatever the style, let your family enjoy the companionship and relaxed good fun of outdoor meals. It's a fine way to beat the heat of a summer kitchen. Here are suggestions for easy packing, good eating for your picnics:

Freeze sweetened, undiluted fruit juice in ice-cube trays, then pack cubes in thermos jug, or crush the cubes and carry in a thermos bottle. At picnic, mix cubes with water for quick chilled fruit punch.

Take along a thermos of hot barbecue sauce. Serve on hamburgers, wieners, chipped ham, sliced pork. Secret of successful barbecue sandwiches—the longer the meat marinates or simmers in sauce, the better the flavor.

Picnic Barbecue Sauce

- 3 tablespoons cider vinegar
 - 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 tablespoon brown sugar
 - 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
 - 1/2 cup tomato ketchup
 - 1/2 cup water
 - 1 tablespoon butter
- Combine all ingredients, heat to boiling point. Add baked ham, luncheon meat, or split wieners. Or use to baste baking ham.

Frosting goes better on cakes than on fingers. For neat feeding, split cakes or cupcakes, spread frosting inside, sandwich-style. Wrap individual servings in wax paper or sandwich bag. Pack juicy fruits (melons, peaches, pears, plums) in crushed ice, carry in a tin box or waterproof plastic bag. Chilled fresh fruit is pure ambrosia after an afternoon of sun-sports. Sliced cheese has a way of dry-

ing out in sandwiches. Mix your cheese into a spicy filling. Good for stuffing chilled celery stalks, too.

Deviled Cheese Spread

- 1 cup grated Canadian cheese
 - 3 tablespoons tomato ketchup
 - 2 teaspoons prepared yellow mustard
 - 2 teaspoons cider vinegar
 - dash of pepper
- Combine all ingredients.

Make up potato salad several hours before the picnic and let stand in the refrigerator to season. Don't skimp on the celery salt or mustard in the dressing. Investigate new drip-proof, tight-covered paper containers for pickles, olives, salads, and fruit. Or take mixed spreads in containers, make sandwiches at picnic. Lettuce should never travel in sandwiches. Wash and drain it well, pack in wax paper or foil.
