### Birth Control And Catholic Doctors

LEEDS, England—Roman Catholic doctors may eventually find themselves excluded from Britain's national health service because of their stand on birth control, a speaker suggested at a meeting here. Mrs. A. Kembal of Manchester, past president of the Catholic Women's League, said the Royal Commission on population had recommended that national health service officials be prepared to offer birth-control advice to any married couple wanting it. She contended that if this were put into effect, Roman Catholic doctors, nurses, midwives and health visitors could not accept office in N.H.S.

Mrs. Kembal, who is a Manchester Alderman, said that what the commission should have emphasized was not the need for birth control but of more and better houses in which children could be brought up.
