Seasonable Ideas for Housekeepers

Apples are known as a dependable "standby" to every Canadian housewife — for pies, sauces, puddings, up-side-down cakes, baking individually or in salads.

Each variety of apple has its own distinctive taste—sweet, mellow or tart. Since some apples are better suited for eating out of hand, and some for baking, care should be taken to select the best variety for the particular purpose. Yellow transparents, Greenings, Wolf River are good cooking apples. Delicious and Snow apples are marvelous eating varieties. McIntosh, Wealthy and Northern Spy are all-purpose apples. Fruit should be chosen that has good color, free from blemishes or bruises and firm to the touch.

Warm temperatures hasten the ripening process and apples lose their crispness and tangy flavor so they should be stored in the refrigerator or a cool, dry store-room. To prevent discoloration of peeled apples, place the slices as they are prepared in a bowl of cold water to which a little salt has been added. Home economists suggest the following recipes designed especially for apples. Applesauce

Sherbet has a cool apple flavor. Royal Apples makes an attractive and colorful dessert and Apple Cereal Pudding has a tasty crunchiness that will be a family favorite.

Applesauce Sherbet
2½ cups sieved, unsweetened applesauce
¼ cup white honey
Few grains salt
¼ to ½ cup sugar (to taste)
2 egg whites
Combine the applesauce, honey, salt and half the sugar, blending well. Beat egg whites until stiff, add remaining sugar gradually, beating until mixture stands in stiff peaks. Fold into applesauce mixture. Pour into tray of refrigerator and freeze, with refrigerator set at coldest point, until solid.
Yield: six servings.
Note: 8 medium apples and 1 cup water will make about 2½ cups applesauce.

ROYAL APPLES
6 apples
½ cup sugar
1½ cups water
Few drops red vegetable coloring
1 egg white
2 tablespoons sugar

Pare and core apples. Cook sugar, water and apple parings for 5 minutes. Remove parings and add red coloring to syrup. Add apples and cook very slowly until tender. Place the apples in a serving dish, cover with the syrup and cool. When thickened, garnish with a meringue made with the egg white and 2 tablespoons sugar. Brown meringue delicately in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F. Serve very cold. Yield: six servings.

APPLE CEREAL PUDDING
2 cups cornflakes OR 1½ cups bran or wheat flakes
2 cups sliced, peeled apples
½ cup brown sugar (firmly packed)
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 tablespoons butter
Place a layer of cereal flakes in a well-greased casserole, then add a layer of thinly sliced apples. Sprinkle with a mixture of brown sugar and cinnamon and dot with part of the butter. Repeat, finishing with cereal flakes. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 350 degrees F., for 30 to 40 minutes. Serve warm or cold with cream. Yield: six servings.

FAMOUS MAT CHAMP RETIRES

REGINA ©—Regina's wrestling policeman, Sergeant Dan Matheson, has retired from the city police force. After 33 years of helping maintain law and order in the Queen City the burly, quiet sergeant with one of the most impressive records in Canadian wrestling history has hung up his uniform.

Sgt. Matheson was instrumental in bringing Regina 31 Canadian wrestling championships from 1923 to 1925 and again in 1931.

Almost as well known as his skill in the ring is his ability as a wrestling instructor. The most famous of his pupils is former British Empire amateur champion Earl McCready, who turned professional in 1939.

Until his retirement at 56, Sgt. Matheson instructed city police recruits in physical training. He also helped organize boxing and wrestling clubs in Regina.

POLE FINDS WIFE AFTER FIVE YEARS

BIRMINGHAM, Eng. ©—Fifty-year-old Pawel Kletke, now working in a Birmingham factory, is patiently awaiting a reunion with his wife, whom he last saw in Poland five years ago.

Until recently he believed she was dead.

Then the German Red Cross wrote that she had been located in Sulingen in the Bremen district of Germany.

"Any time now she'll be coming over to join me," Kletke said.

For a while after the German invasion of Poland in 1939, Pawel fought with the Polish Army. After the German occupation he worked in his home town. It was in 1944 that he last saw his wife, for he then became a member of a Polish division of the Russian Army.

When he got back to Lodz in 1945, Pawel's family had vanished. Neighbors said they believed his wife was dead and exhaustive inquiries failed to reveal her whereabouts.
