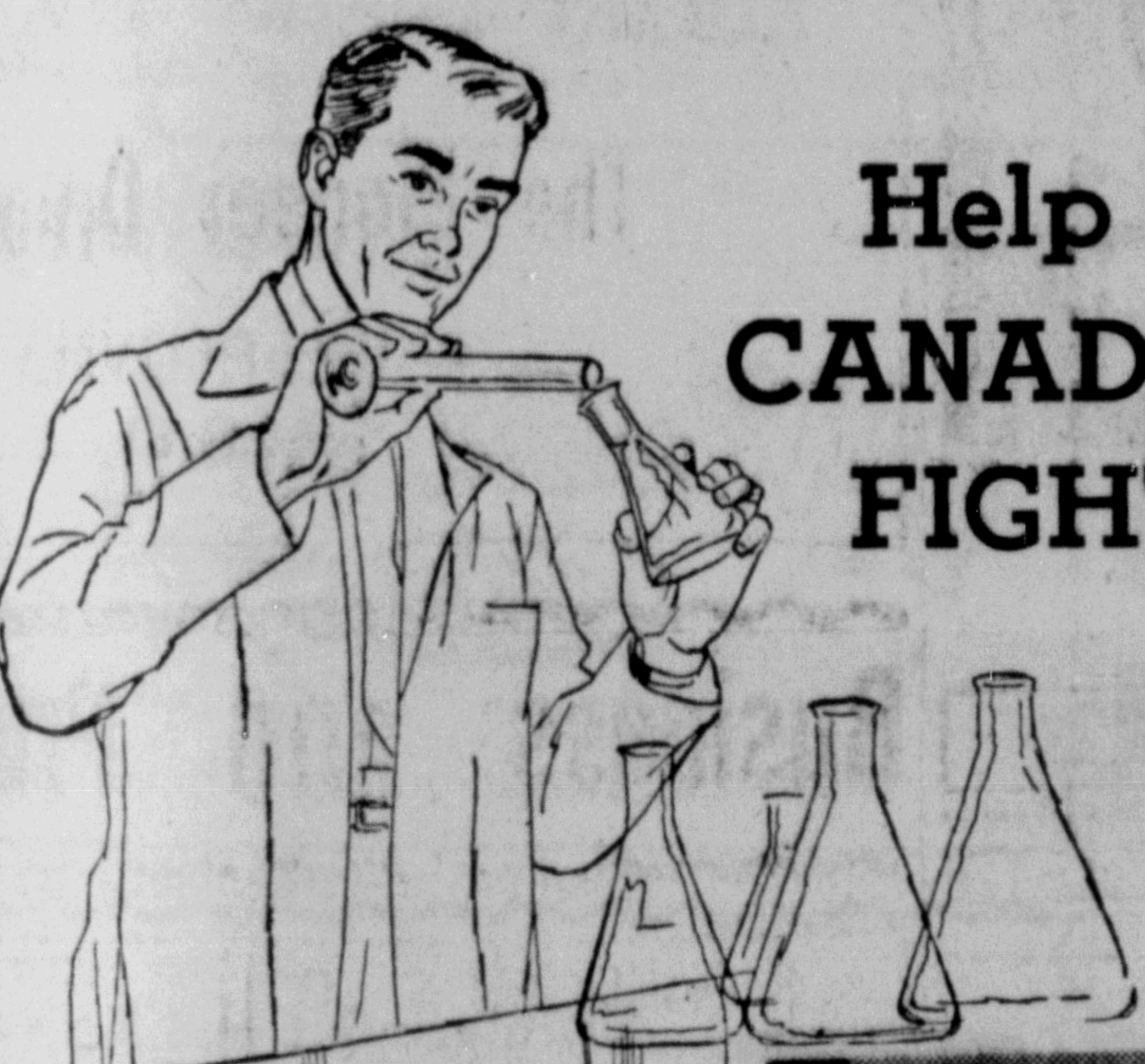

Fire Destroys Alaska Hospital

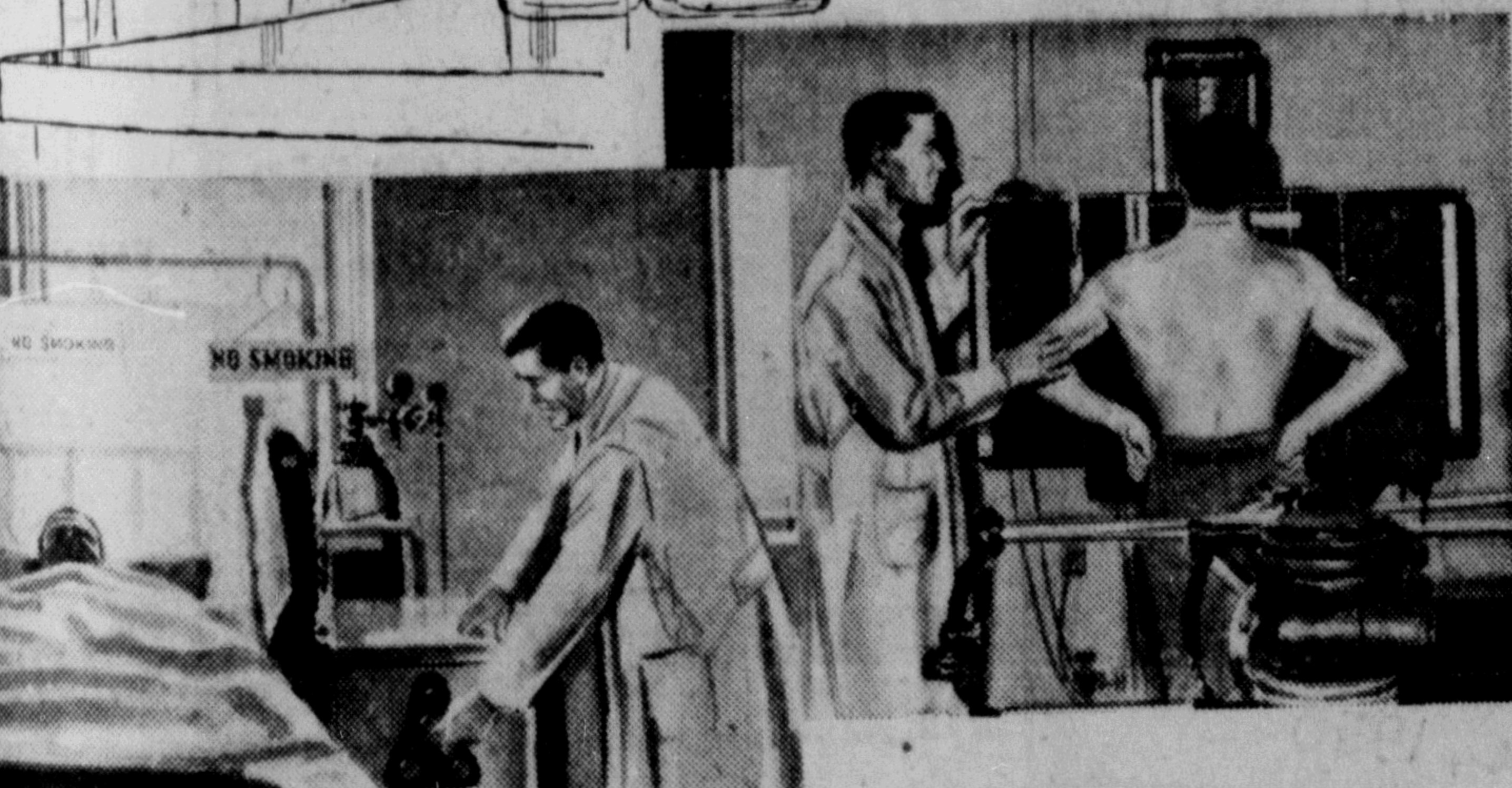
FAIRBANKS — A hospital at Bethel was destroyed by fire last night. There were seventy beds, and all patients were safely removed. A member of the hospi-
