PILGRIMAGE TO HURONIA

Martyrdom of Five Priests
in Indian War to be Recalled

MIDLAND, Ont.—Descendants
of the victors and vanquished in
the sanguinary Iroquois con-
quest of Huronia, three centur-
ies ago this year, will meet at
the martyr's shrine for a spe-
cial Indian pilgrimage this
week-end to commemorate the
memories of the five Jesuit mis-
sionaries who were martyred by
the Iroquois during the obiter-
ation of the Huron nation.

Rev. T. J. Lally, director of
the shrine, announced that the
famous Iroquois choir of mixed
voices from Caughnawaga near
Montreal, will participate in
their ceremonial costumes. To-
gether with the Algonquin
Ojibways of Manitoulin Island
in their picturesque tribal dress.
Many other Ojibways, whose
ancestors lived along the bound-
aries of Huronia and in the
thirty thousand islands of
Georgian Bay but were thrust
westward by the Iroquois to Lake
Superior district, will come
from Long Lac on the Canad-
ian National Transcontinental
Line, Nipigon and other points
to the head of the Great Lakes.

One of the outstanding com-
memoration ceremonies will be
a pilgrimage over the old Huron
Trail from the mission village
of St. Louis, where Fathers John
De Brebeuf and Abriel Lale-
mant were captured and taken
to St. Ignace, three miles away,
there to meet martyrdom under
terrible torture on March 16,
1649.

regional auditor, Canadian Na-

city on the Prince Rupert this
afternoon from Vancouver. They
will leave on tonight's train for
the east.
