## Legion Week Is Coming Up

Saturday and the seven days following will be dedicated to the dead and veterans of foreign wars. All across Canada plans for Legion Week are in their initial stages.

In Prince Rupert, Saturday is Poppy Day. Funds collected from sale of poppies are used to aid veterans in need or distress. President J. Nicoll said yesterday over 60 percent of the funds raised were kept in Prince Rupert to aid Branch 27 to carry on its task of providing assistance to all veterans in the community, whether members of the Legion or not. P. M. Ray and S. A. Cheeseman are in charge of sales. Poppies have been sent from Prince Rupert branch to Masset, Sandspit, Port Clements and other points not served by Provincial Command. Morning of November 4 poppy headquarters will open at the old Overwaitea Store. Sunday the Legion will parade from the Legion Hall to First Presbyterian Church, where Rev. E. A. Wright, D.D., has planned a special service in memory of the men who fell.

Monday there will be a card party by the Women's Auxiliary. Tuesday will see work parties preparing for the bazaar Wednesday, and in the evening committee meetings to make final arrangements for the Bazaar and the banquet Saturday night.

On Wednesday the bazaar will be followed in the evening by a dance.

Thursday will bring a showing of films.

Friday night is "Bring the Missus" night with a program by Legion personnel and a dance following.

Saturday, Armistice Day, there will be a parade from the Legion Hall to the Cenotaph, where there will be a service. Following the parade will be refreshments at the armories. In the evening there will be a dance.

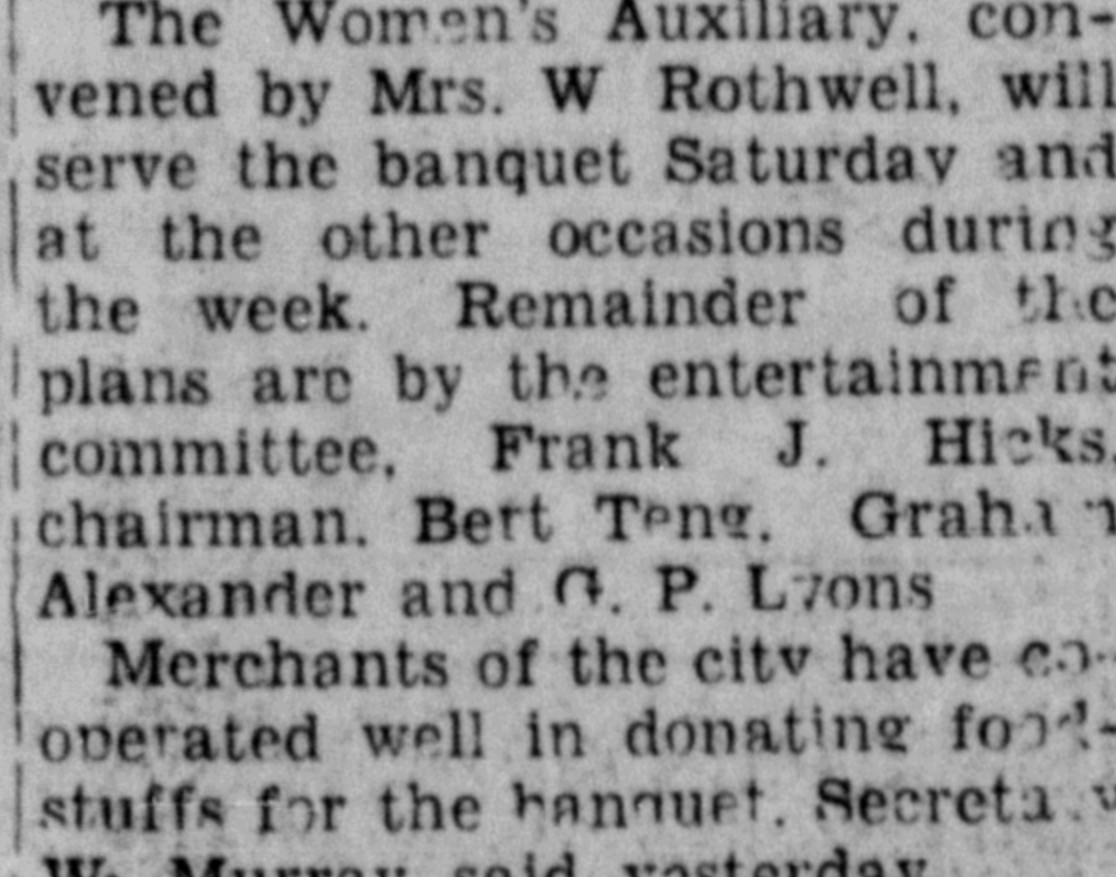
Thus will be honored the soldiers of overseas wars.
