WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?

Beans are a favorite home vegetable of this country for the excellent reasons they give heavy yields, are easy to eat, and excel in value. They rival the bean of our gardens in snap bean, formerly called string bean, but so improved the plant breeders that varieties have strings are all obsolete.

Beans in the home garden are so young the seeds have not begun to form in the pods, a dish of round-green or wax beans is some-thing for gourmets to rave at. They are easy to grow and warm up, and danger is over, before planting the seed.

There are four general types of beans: the green and yellow each divided into pod and round pod. Market beans are usually flat pod, yield better than the round pod; and the latter have best quality.

Between the green and wax beans there are slight differences in vitamin content, the green excelling in vitamin A, the wax in vitamin B, but both among our most nutritious foods.

In recent years few wax beans have been seen in markets; but in the opinion of many they are more tender and of better flavor than green beans.

Bush beans are at the height of flavor and tenderness from the time they have just begun to form, until they begin to make seeds; and they deteriorate somewhat after that. Both for the table and for canning they should be picked before seeds form, and not more than an hour before they are cooked.

Canning snap beans requires special precautions to kill the botulinus germ, and before it is attempted the advice of canning experts should be sought.

If bean plants are kept picked clean, they will continue to bear all summer, producing several crops, as long as the plants are healthy. But since the first crop is always the largest, it is advisable to make several sowings in succession, so that new plants keep coming into bearing.

Dusting regularly with D.D.T. will protect beans from the leaf hoppers, which sap the strength of the plants and greatly reduce their yield. The Mexican bean beetle resists D.D.T. but can be killed with rotenone.

PEACE BRIDGE IS MADE SAFE

WHITEHORSE—The bridge across the Peace River on the Alaska Highway has been made safe through the services of army and civilian engineers and workmen, kept busy all winter. The job was big and important, for the bridge is a vital one.

It was discovered last year that the \$4,000,000 suspension span, 2,100 feet long, was in danger of crashing because swift river waters had undermined one of the 250-foot towers. The tower had leaned 14 inches out of line and, by then, the Peace River was sheathed in seven feet of ice. Divers worked through the Arctic winter under 7 feet of ice to build a steel cofferdam—a watertight casement to save the bridge.

It was a race against river water and ice. It was feared the spring thaw and ice might force the pier off its foundations, unless the casement was finished first, and this was accomplished.

HOME IS BROKEN IN THREE PARTS

TERRACE—Only a narrow strip remains of what were once the spacious lawn and flower gardens of the Sherwood home on the edge of the raging Skeena. The garage went into the river last Saturday and the house was broken into three parts when it was being moved across the road in an attempt to save it. The Kinsmen were called out at 6 a.m. on Friday and worked hard all day to save the property as far as possible.

On Saturday, gangs of volunteer workers filled sandbags to dam a culvert which was rapidly flooding between Perry's and Sherwood's and threatening to isolate the residents of that section. The danger was stemmed.

The river dropped two feet on Monday and has not come up again. It is not known yet if the flood waters have done any damage on Braun's Island beyond ruining this year's crops.
