

RUSSIANS ARE EXCLUDED

OTTAWA-In reaffirmation of blunt policy, the Army excluded Russia yesterday from a list of eight countries whose military attaches will visit the training base at Valcartier Quebec, this week. The policy denies Russian military representatives from the privileges of visiting Canadian military establishments until similar privileges are accorded Canadian representatives in Moscow.

#### LOGGERS FOR CONCILIATION

VANCOUVER-Officials of the International Woodworkers of America, representing 42,000 lumber workers in British Columbia, yesterday agreed to apply for conciliation proceedings to break the wages dispute deadlock with the operators. A union council meeting decided to seek conciliation under the British Columbia labor code and have it apply to the entire industry in the province. A previously announced strike vote of 27,000 union members in the coast region has been delayed meantime.

## DUROCHER GOING STRONG

NEW YORK-Leo Durocher is off to a splendid start in the toughest baseball job he has ever tackled -managing the ertswhile enemy New York Giants. Preparing to tangle with the St. Louis Cardinals and with second place perhaps at stake, the Giants, under "The Lip" have won three out of four games to pull up within half a game of runner-up spot. Already the team is running and hustling as never before. The Durocher influence was noted in yesterday's 14 to 2 rout of the Reas in Cincinnati. "You can't help going all out for Leo," one Giant said yesterday. "He just generates fire.

HALIFAX—Thirty per cent of the voting populace of Halifax turned out in yesterday's plebiscite and chose for sale of beer by the glass by a vote of 2 to 1. Thirteen other towns, counties and cities will take a similar vote this summer.

## NEW COAST SHIPS COMING

VICTORIA—The two new coastal vessels for the Canadian Pacific Railway will come from the builders in Britain this winter. The Princess Marguerite is due here in January and the Princess Patricia will leave the builders in February. Both will be in time for service next season.
