ORGANIZE HERE

Accountants of City Form Study Group—Association Planned Later

A study club under the auspices of the Vancouver branch of the General Accountants' Association of Canada was formed at an organizational meeting of the General Accountants' Association held in the Civic Centre on Wednesday evening. Eventually it is planned to organize a branch of the Association in this city.

The meeting was called by two members of the Vancouver branch board of directors, H. B. Everett, C.G.A., chairman of the public practice committee, and H. M. Clarke, C.G.A., the executive secretary.

Mr. Clarke put forward the aims and objects of the Association which is a Dominion-wide organization with branches in all principal cities in Canada. The total membership is about 1500 with about 260 of this number in British Columbia. The Association sets standards of proficiency in accounting and allied subjects and grants the degree of Certified General Accountant and the privilege of the use of the initials "C.G.A." to candidates who are successful in the examinations.

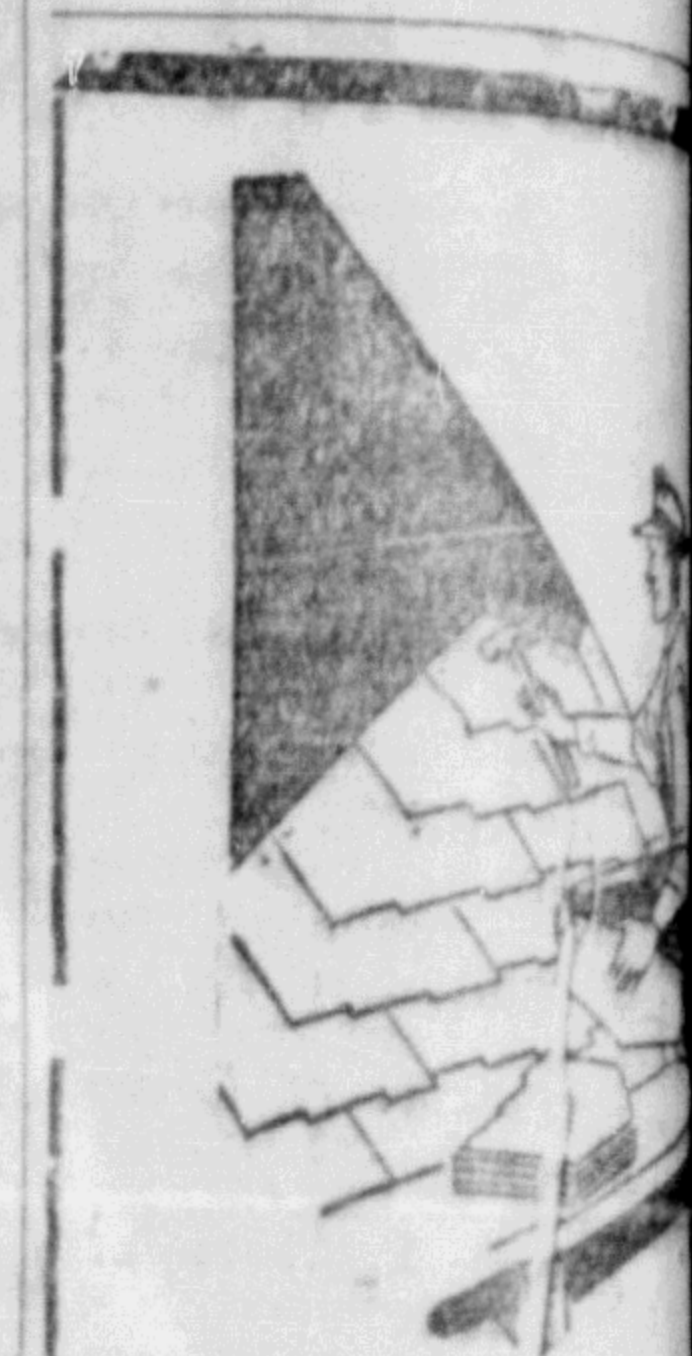
