## T.B. Seals

THOUSANDS of Christmas Seals are being put in the mails by tuberculosis associations all across Canada including Prince Rupert where the Kinsmen are again carrying on the work.

The Christmas Seals represent an opportunity to contribute to the campaign against tuberculosis. Much of the money will be spent to fight tuberculosis in our own community.

Last year more than 5,000 people died in Canada of tuberculosis. The tragedy of this is that all these lives could have been saved. In this day and age no one need die of tuberculosis, because T.B. if found early enough can be cured. It can also be prevented, because tuberculosis is a contagious disease which can be kept from spreading by isolating in sanatoriums all those who have it in infectious form. The prime requisite in both prevention and cure is, of course, that the disease be discovered in its early stages.

The only sure way of detecting tuberculosis is by X-ray and that is the reason that so many mass surveys have been carried on the last few years. Already one province has been completely surveyed in this manner and others are nearing completion. Much of the money from Christmas Seals goes to pay for these surveys.

For twenty-two years the sale of Seals has been carried on in this country and during that time the death rate has fallen almost fifty percent. This in itself should indicate the value of the Seal Sale. Any contribution made to it is money well spent.

## Royal Grandmother, Great Grandmother and Mother Knit New Baby's Clothes

### Baptismal Arrangements Discussed As Blessed Event Approaches— Choice of Pram

LONDON—Because the private chapel at Buckingham Palace is still bomb-wrecked Princess Elizabeth's baby is likely to be baptized in the small, beautiful church of St. Mary Magdalene at Sandringham, Norfolk.

The King, himself baptized in this church which stands in the park of Sandringham House, is said to be in favor of having his first grandchild christened there. It will be a private ceremony, conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Geoffrey Fisher.

This problem was solved by the Queen who looked up all the baby things she had had for her own daughters and among them found a heavy, old-fashioned model, superior in springing and fittings to any that can be produced today for the home market.

Three of the baby's aunts—Philip's three sisters—are German by marriage and so far have not been mentioned as godparents.

#### THE MATERNITY ROOM

At Buckingham Palace the Queen has personally supervised convention of Elizabeth's bedroom on the second floor into a maternity ward. Like most grandmothers-to-be, she has taken a keen interest in preparations for the event and has knitted some baby garments herself.

Most of the baby's clothes not made by Princess Elizabeth herself, come from Queen Mary, who has knitted a whole pile of baby garments in her regular, machine-like stitching. She is a recognized specialist in shawls and crocheted cot-covers and it was she who taught the Princesses to knit when they were young.

One problem that has been settled after a good deal of thought concerned the choosing of a pram for the Royal infant. Elizabeth was not much attracted by the modern utility

## VETERANS AT ANNUAL DINNER

### Remembrance Banquet and Program Well Attended

Comradeship and experiences of the first and second World Wars were recalled by more than 300 Canadian Legion members Thursday afternoon at the annual Remembrance Day dinner and smoker held by the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Legion in the armory.

Speeches, vocal and instrumental solos and community singing made up the program which followed a cold plate dinner served by an energetic group of Canadian Legion Women's Auxiliary members. The function was one of the best-attended of its type in recent years.

The program was opened with a period of silence and Grace was said by Ralph Smith, Legion president. Following the dinner, Mr. Smith welcomed the guests and introduced Mayor Nora Arnold and Col. S. D. Johnston, commanding officer of the 120th Anti-Aircraft Battery.

Mayor Arnold opened her address with a gesture of tribute to the late V. G. Houston, former president of the Canadian Legion, proposing a toast to his memory in which the assembly joined.

"The Canadian Legion," Mayor Arnold said, "still stands by the principles which drove you from your comfortable lives to fight for the right of man to live and let live, enjoy freedom from fear and want, freedom of religion and the right of all people to live their lives as human beings and not as chattels and slaves."

"You form a healthy nucleus of public opinion in every community and you have, with your mighty numbers, a terrific power for good all through the country. There is now no shooting war but there is a constant, insidious attack on the things for which you fought and I am sure that, in peace as in war, you will close the ranks and push the enemy back to his last stronghold and beat him there."

President Ralph Smith told the gathering that, if they forgot the sacrifices of the past in the problems of the present, they were breaking faith with those who had fallen.

"By honoring the dead, we help the living," he declared. "Let us here stand behind our aims and objects as never before."

Wreaths were laid by the local branch of the Canadian Legion, the Women's Auxiliary of the Canadian Legion, Sandspit and District branch of the Canadian Legion, Women's Canadian Club, City of Prince Rupert, Officers and Men of H.M.C.S. Chatham, Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, Independent Order of Oddfellows, Navy League of Canada, Prince Rupert branch, Captain Cook Corps, Royal Canadian Sea Cadets, as well as by relatives of several members of the armed forces who lost their lives.

Immediately after the parade, officers of the Canadian Legion and Women's Auxiliary proceeded to Fairview Cemetery to decorate graves in the soldiers' plot.
