Public Health In February

A total of 237 patients were X-rayed for tuberculosis at the coast travelling clinic of the Division of Tuberculosis Control which recently visited Prince Rupert. Those who were examined will shortly be advised as to the findings of the plates. The regular public health staff visited 46 cases of tuberculosis during the month and 88 contacts.

During February, according to the monthly report of the Prince Rupert Health Unit, 360 pupils were examined by public health nurses in the city. Six examinations were made at Digby Island by the health officer, Dr. Duncan Black.

Communicable diseases reported during the month included 58 cases of chickenpox, 36 cases of measles and 19 of mumps. In his report Dr. Black stresses the importance of strict isolation of infected cases and rigid quarantine of any potential contacts.

The well baby clinic had attendance of an even one hundred during the month—66 infants and 34 pre-school. There were 126 home school visits.

The goal clinic is reported functioning well and during the month 38 inmates were examined.

Interior

Other activities of the public health staff during February included five days of visiting at Smithers and Hazelton by the medical health officer, the senior public health nurse and the sanitarian. Checking of sanitation at farms and dairy plants, in a drive to obtain the highest quality and greatest purity of milk, was carried out.

During February 26 examinations of school children were completed at Terrace. Seven cases of tuberculosis and five contacts were visited. The well baby clinic at Terrace had an attendance of fifteen.

In the Smithers, Ketchikan and Houston district staff activity included extensive school visits. 91 examinations being made at Houston. Home visits were also made and well baby clinics held.
