Mosquitoes No Menace

Electric Light Rates, Radio Reception Discussed by Officials With Terrace Board
TERRACE—Only an increased use of electricity by the people of Terrace can bring about a reduction of rates of 12c and 8c which are now being charged, T. M. Gibson, regional superintendent of the British Columbia Power Commission, told the Terrace and District Board of Trade at its monthly meeting last week. Although there are 388 power customers now as compared with 47 two years ago, the per capita consumption remains extremely low. At the same time, rates here compared favorably with other towns.

A. I. Deacon, inspector of the Department of Transport radio division, reported on local radio interference and attributed the most of it to local causes which could be rectified through improvement of wiring and filtering of certain sources such as fluorescent lighting.
 The Department of Health at Victoria does not take such a serious view of the mosquito and black fly nuisance as does the district itself and, while not being willing to contribute financially, advised the Board that it is ready to advise on how they can be eradicated. The Board was assured that, while they might be a nuisance, they were no menace to health.

Next meeting of the Board will be the annual dinner in January to which invitations will be sent to E. T. Applewhite, M.P. for Skeena, and other guests including members of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce.
