Blackwood On Bridge

Here is a fact you may find it hard to believe. When you are vulnerable and opponents are not, you should bid small slams even if the odds are slightly against you. In this situation you gain 750 points if you make the slam and lose only about 600 points if you don't.

That is, if you go set the opponents score a 100-point penalty, and you also lose the trick points (about 150) and the value of the game (350 points) which you would have made if you had stopped short of the unmakeable slam.

But don't forget that if your sporting shot at slam misfires, you are still vulnerable, playing against non-vulnerable opponents, so that the odds are still three to one you will finally win the rubber.
